Things to do in Graz

Landmarks & Monuments

Graz is home to iconic structures that define the city's skyline and tell stories of centuries past. From the iconic Schlossberg to elegant town squares, these landmarks showcase the city's rich architectural heritage.

Schlossberg Must See

The iconic **Schlossberg** (Castle Hill) dominates Graz's skyline with its distinctive clock tower and fortress walls. Originally built in the 16th century as a defensive fortress, this massive sandstone structure offers panoramic views of the city and surrounding Styrian countryside. Visitors can climb 260 steps or take the funicular railway to reach the summit. The site features the famous **Uhrturm** (clock tower), a symbol of the city, along with walking paths, a restaurant, and the underground Kasematten tunnel system.



Town Hall (Rathaus) Top Pick

Its distinctive "friendly alien" design has become an iconic symbol of modern Graz.

Accessible via funicular railway, this UNESCO World Heritage site offers fascinating tours exploring Austrian fortress architecture and regional history within 45 minutes of Graz.

Practical Information

Best Months to Visit

May-June: Perfect spring weather, parks in full bloom, cultural festivals begin. Temperatures 18-25°C (64-77°F).

September-October: Warm summer lingers with occasional rain, fewer tourists than summer. Temperatures 15-20°C (59-68°F). Ideal for wine harvest season visits.

December: Magical Christmas markets, festive atmosphere, holiday decorations. Temperatures 0-5°C (32-41°F).

Peak season (July-August): Warmest weather (20-27°C / 68-81°F), most crowded, hotel prices highest.

Winter (November-February): Cold and occasional snow (temps -2 to 4°C / 28-39°F). Fewer tourists, lower prices, but reduced hours for some attractions.



Getting Around Graz

Public Transport: Excellent tram and bus network operated by HOLDING Graz. Purchase single tickets or multi-day passes from kiosks or vending machines. Day cards provide unlimited travel for groups or frequent riders.

Bicycle: Graz is extremely bike-friendly with extensive cycling infrastructure. Rent bikes from numerous shops or use public bike-sharing system. Most attractions accessible via flat, dedicated cycle paths.

Walking: The compact old town is best explored on foot. All major attractions within 20-minute walk radius. Streets are well-marked with tourist signage.

Taxis & Ride-sharing: Taxis readily available at stations and can be summoned by phone. Uber and local apps operate in Graz.

Airport: Graz Airport (GRZ) located 10km south. Accessible by shuttle bus, taxi, or rental car (20-30 minutes to city center).

Train: Excellent rail connections to Vienna (2.5 hours), Salzburg (3 hours), and other European cities. Main station is walking distance from old town.

➔ Airport Transfer

Graz Airport (GRZ) to city center:

- **City Bus 630:** Runs to Graz Hauptbahnhof and city center in about 20-25 minutes, tickets around €2.50
- **S-Bahn train (S5):** Direct service from the airport station to Graz Hauptbahnhof in roughly 8 minutes, about €2.50
- **Taxi:** Around 15-20 minutes to the city center, typically €20-25
- **Private transfer:** Pre-booked door-to-door service to central Graz in about 15 minutes, roughly €35-45

Shopping in Graz

Fashion & Boutiques: Lendviertel features independent boutiques with designer clothing. Herrengasse and Auergasse in old town offer local shops and international brands. Altstadt passages hide artisanal shops selling handmade items.

Markets: Hauptmarkt (main market) operates daily for fresh produce, flowers, and local products. Weekend farmers' markets showcase Styrian specialties including pumpkin oil, wines, and cheeses.

Souvenirs: Traditional Austrian items including lederhosen, dirndls, crystal, and wood carvings available throughout old town. Look for authentic local crafts in Kunsthofpassage galleries.

Food & Wine: Specialty shops sell Styrian wines, pumpkin oil, speck (bacon), and strudel. Department stores (Kastner & Öhler, Humanic) offer full shopping ranges.

Bargaining: Not customary in shops. Markets may allow modest negotiation for multiple items. Fixed prices standard in retail establishments.

Annual Events & Festivals

February: Steirischer Frühling (Styrian Spring) - avant-garde arts festival featuring experimental theater, music, dance.

April-May: Diagonale Film Festival - important Austrian film festival showcasing contemporary cinema.

June: Steirischer Herbst preview events, summer outdoor concerts begin in parks.

July-August: Open-air cinema series, river festivals, Schlossbergfest (castle hill festival), outdoor theater.

September: Steirischer Herbst (Styrian Autumn) - major festival featuring art, music, theater, literature (4 weeks).

October: 72-hour Festival - contemporary art event, film festival, cultural programs.



November-December: Christmas markets throughout city (Hauptplatz, Schlossbergplatz), festive lights, holiday concerts.

Public Holidays: January 1 (New Year), Easter Monday, May 1 (Labor), May 20 (Ascension), June 10 (Corpus Christi), August 15 (Assumption), October 26 (National), November 1 (All Saints), December 25-26 (Christmas).

Sample Day-by-Day Itineraries

Day 1 - Historic Graz Essentials

Morning: Climb Schlossberg via funicular for panoramic views. Explore castle grounds and tunnels (2 hours). Lunch at mountain café. Afternoon: Descend and wander narrow streets of Altstadt, stopping at shop windows and small cafes. Visit Graz Cathedral and appreciate exterior frescoes (1 hour). Evening: Dinner at traditional wine tavern in old town, enjoy Styrian specialties.

Day 2 - Art & Culture

Morning: Visit Kunsthaus Graz, exploring contemporary art exhibitions (2 hours). Coffee break at museum café. Afternoon: Tour Universalmuseum Joanneum's natural history and paleontology sections (2 hours). Stroll through Münzgrabenstraße admiring Art Nouveau mansions. Evening: Catch cultural event at theater or concert hall, check schedule in advance.

Day 3 - Baroque Splendor & Countryside

Morning: Day trip to Eggenberg Palace. Explore opulent rooms, then wander UNESCO gardens for 2-3 hours. Lunch at palace restaurant. Afternoon: Drive to nearby wine village or relax in palace gardens. Evening: Return to Graz for riverside sunset walk along Mur, visit Mur Island.

Day 4 - Modern & Alternative Graz

Morning: Explore Lendviertel galleries, boutiques, and street art (1.5 hours). Coffee at trendy local café. Afternoon: Visit Kunsthofpassage and discover street art installations (45 minutes). Browse independent shops and artist studios. Tour modern Domplatz features. Evening: Dinner at contemporary restaurant in Lendviertel, experience city's creative culture.

Day 5 - Nature & Relaxation

Morning: Bike ride along Mur River path through green corridor. Stop at riverside cafes. Afternoon: Picnic in Stadtpark, rent boats on the small lake (2 hours). Leisurely walk through different park sections. Visit any missed museums or attractions. Evening: Sunset views from Schlossberg or peaceful evening stroll through illuminated old town.

Instagram & Photography Locations

Schlossberg Clock Tower: Most iconic Graz image. Shoot from Hauptplatz at sunset for dramatic backlighting. Golden hour (30 minutes before sunset) provides perfect light. Night shots show beautiful illumination.

Mur Island at Sunset: Capture the organic architecture reflecting in water. Best photographed from north bridge (Murkanal) during golden hour. Evening reflections create stunning mirror images.

Altstadt Narrow Streets: Early morning light creates dramatic shadows on colorful facades. Winding cobblestone streets photograph beautifully with people for scale and atmosphere. Avoid midday harsh shadows.

Kunsthaus (Blue Building): Most photogenic from across the river or from Murinsel. Afternoon light best for color saturation. Reflections in wet streets create artistic compositions.

Cathedral Dome Interior: Capture intricate vaulting and light filtering through stained glass. Early morning provides best interior lighting without harsh shadows.

Art Nouveau Mansions: Münzgrabenstraße architectural details photograph beautifully. Morning light creates sharp detail. Close-up detail shots of ornate facades are striking.

Eggenberg Palace Gardens: Formal garden geometry best captured from elevated viewpoints. Spring (tulips) and fall (colors) offer seasonal photographic advantages.



Domplatz Modern Water Features: Capture interaction between historic cathedral and contemporary elements. Evening illumination highlights the contrast beautifully.

Lendviertel Street Art: Constantly changing murals. Visit regularly for new photo opportunities. Golden hour provides dramatic side-lighting of large wall paintings.

Electricity & Utilities

Voltage: Austria uses 230V AC with 50Hz frequency (standard for Europe).

Plug Types: European Type C (two round pins) and Type E (round pins with grounding clip) are standard. Most hotels have additional Type F sockets available.

Adapters: Essential for non-European devices. Dual voltage adapters (110-240V) recommended for charging electronics. Most hotels provide adapters at reception if needed.

Phone Compatibility: Austria uses GSM/4G networks. European phones work seamlessly. Consider local SIM cards or roaming packages with home providers.

Outlet Availability: Most hotels provide USB charging ports and additional outlets. Hostels and budget accommodations may have limited outlets; power strips useful.

Must-Try Dishes & Dining Tips

Regional Specialties: *Styrian Pumpkin Soup* - creamy autumn favorite with pumpkin seed oil drizzle. *Steirerkas* - pungent local cheese. *Speck* - smoked bacon served as appetizer. *Steirisches Kernöl* - pumpkin seed oil used in salads and cooking.

Traditional Dishes: *Schnitzel* - breaded meat cutlet served with lemon. *Erdäpfelpuffer* - potato pancakes with applesauce. *Stelze* - roasted pork knuckle. *Wiener Schnitzel* - Austrian classic.

Desserts: *Apfelstrudel* - apple pastry roll with vanilla sauce. *Sachertorte* - chocolate cake with apricot jam. *Potica* - Slovenian-influenced spiral pastry.

Wine Tradition: *Sturm* - partially fermented new wine (September-November specialty). Styrian white wines, especially Sauvignon Blancs and Grüner Veltliners, pair perfectly with local cuisine.

Dining Customs: Lunch (midday) is main meal. Dinner eaten 6-9pm. Tipping 5-10% standard for good service (rounding up acceptable). Many restaurants close 2-5pm between lunch and dinner service.

Restaurant Types: *Stube* - cozy traditional tavern. *Gasthaus* - pub-style restaurant. *Würstelstand* - sausage vendors with standing area.

The **Graz Card** provides unlimited public transportation plus free or reduced admission to major attractions including Kunsthaus Graz, Schloss Eggenberg, museums, and visitor attractions. Represents excellent value for tourists planning multiple visits.
