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Things to do in Sarajevo

Landmarks & Monuments

Sarajevo's iconic landmarks reflect centuries of Ottoman, Austro-Hungarian, and Bosnian heritage. From the reconstructed Stari Most to modern memorials, these structures tell the city's complex and compelling story.



Baščaršija (Old Town) Must See

2-3 hours No Booking Needed

The historic heart of Sarajevo, this Ottoman-era bazaar district features narrow winding streets, traditional shops, copper workshops, and authentic cafés. Built in the 15th century under Ottoman rule, Baščaršija beautifully preserves the city's multicultural heritage with its maze-like layout, wooden-framed buildings, and vibrant atmosphere.



Latin Bridge (Principov Most) Must See

The historical bridge where Archduke Franz Ferdinand was assassinated in 1914, an event that triggered World War I. This 16th-century Ottoman bridge spans the Miljacka River and remains one of Sarajevo's most historically significant landmarks. A poignant reminder of the city's pivotal role in 20th-century history.



Sarajevo City Hall (Vijećnica) Must See

An architectural masterpiece of Austro-Hungarian design, this stunning building served as City Hall and was severely damaged during the Bosnian War. Recently restored to its former glory, it now functions as the National Library and is a symbol of Sarajevo's resilience and cultural importance.

Sebilj Fountain Top Pick

A picturesque Ottoman fountain in Baščaršija's main square, featuring ornate wooden architecture and a bronze turtle sculpture. Local tradition holds that drinking from this fountain guarantees your return to Sarajevo. This iconic landmark is a perfect photo spot and gathering place in the old town.

Tips for Landmarks & Monuments

- Visit Baščaršija early morning to avoid crowds and enjoy authentic atmosphere
- Wear comfortable walking shoes for the uneven cobblestone streets
- Respect local customs when visiting religious and historical sites



- Photography at the Latin Bridge is popular—visit at sunset for best lighting

Bosnia and Herzegovina National Museum

Must See

Located in the Austro-Hungarian building that once served as the Olympic Museum, this comprehensive museum features extensive collections spanning natural history, archaeology, ethnography, and art. The museum houses the famous Sarajevo Haggadah, a 14th-century Jewish manuscript of immense cultural and historical significance.

Sarajevo War Tunnel Museum

Must See

A haunting and historically significant museum preserving a 800-meter tunnel built during the Bosnian War as a lifeline for the besieged city. The museum includes an original tunnel section and exhibits documenting the siege, offering powerful insights into Sarajevo's recent tragic history and the resilience of its people.



Sarajevo Museum of Crimes Against Humanity

An important and sobering museum dedicated to documenting the atrocities committed during the 1990s Bosnian War. Through photographs, testimonies, and artifacts, it provides education on war crimes and genocide, serving as a memorial to victims and a resource for understanding recent Balkan history.

An expansive gallery showcasing contemporary and historical Bosnian art, including paintings, sculptures, and multimedia works. The collection represents the evolution of Bosnian artistic expression and features works by renowned local and regional artists, reflecting cultural identity and artistic innovation.

Tips for Museums & Galleries

- The War Tunnel museum is emotionally intense—allow time to process the experience
- Book tickets in advance for the National Museum during peak season
- Many museums offer guided tours in English—inquire at entry
- Most museums are closed on Mondays; check opening hours in advance



Religious Sites

Sarajevo is famous as a city where multiple faiths coexist harmoniously. Its diverse religious architecture—mosques, churches, and synagogues—represents centuries of Ottoman and Central European influence and symbolizes interfaith tolerance.

Gazi Husrev-bey Mosque Must See

The largest and most important mosque in Bosnia and Herzegovina, built in 1532 during Ottoman rule. This architectural gem features elegant Ottoman design with a beautiful courtyard, ornate interior decorations, and a functioning madrasa. The attached bazaar remains an active commercial center preserving Ottoman traditions of integrated community and commerce.

Cathedral of Jesus the Saviour Must See

An impressive Orthodox Christian cathedral with distinctive golden onion domes, prominently situated on the Sarajevo skyline. Built in the late 19th century during Austro-Hungarian rule, the cathedral showcases Byzantine-influenced Orthodox architecture and contains elaborate interior mosaics. It remains an active place of worship and important cultural monument.



Ashkenazi Synagogue (Jewish Museum) Must See

Sacred Heart Cathedral (Rimokatolička Katedrala) Top Pick

The cathedral showcases the city's religious diversity and serves as a testament to Sarajevo's multicultural Christian heritage during different historical periods.

Tips for Religious Sites

- Dress modestly when visiting mosques and churches; remove shoes in mosques
- Photography inside religious buildings may be restricted—ask permission
- Prayer times may affect visiting hours—check in advance



- Ramadan observance will affect mosque visiting hours
- Interfaith tours are available and highly recommended for understanding the city's religious tolerance



Squares & Streets

Sarajevo's public squares and streets form the vibrant heart of the city, serving as social gathering spaces and showcasing architectural diversity. These spaces reveal the city's layered history and contemporary character.



Bascarsija Square (Piazza) Must See

The lively main square of the Old Town, surrounded by traditional shops, restaurants, and the iconic Sebilj fountain. This pedestrian-friendly plaza buzzes with activity and authentic atmosphere, offering visitors a genuine taste of Ottoman-era Sarajevo with a modern twist. Perfect for people-watching and soaking in local culture.

Ferhadija Street (Pedestrian Boulevard) Top Pick

Sarajevo's main pedestrian shopping street connecting Baščaršija to the modern city center. This tree-lined boulevard features contemporary shops, cafés, restaurants, and street performers. The street beautifully illustrates Sarajevo's blend of old and new, with Austro-Hungarian architecture standing alongside modern establishments.

Obala Iska Osmanovića (Riverside Promenade) Top Pick

Tips for Squares & Streets

- Explore Baščaršija on foot—the narrow streets are designed for pedestrians only
- Ferhadija Street is ideal for shopping and people-watching during evenings
- The riverside promenade is peaceful in early morning or late afternoon
- Street vendors and cafés are throughout—embrace the leisurely pace of local life

Baščaršija (Old Town District) Must See

Austro-Hungarian Quarter Top Pick

Built during the Austro-Hungarian occupation (1878-1918), this neighborhood features elegant belle époque architecture, wide boulevards, and European-style city planning. Iconic buildings like City Hall and the National Museum anchor this quarter, which elegantly demonstrates Central European urban design principles and cultural influence.



Ilidža (Spa Town) Top Pick

Tips for Neighborhoods & Districts

- Each neighborhood reflects different historical periods—exploring them chronologically helps understand Sarajevo's evolution
- Use the tram system to navigate between neighborhoods efficiently
- Local residents are friendly and often willing to share neighborhood recommendations
- Evening strolls through neighborhoods offer different atmosphere than daytime visits



Parks & Gardens

Vrelo Bosne (Spring of the Bosna) Must See

- Vrelo Bosne is a must-visit for experiencing unspoiled Bosnian nature
- Bring comfortable hiking shoes for park trails and forest walks
- The Kovačici chairlift is operational during daylight hours—check operating times
- Visit parks early morning for peaceful atmosphere and best photography light
- Bring water and snacks for longer park explorations

Mostar & Stari Most Must See

The charming riverside town offers authentic cuisine and culture distinct from Sarajevo.

Ilidža & Yellow Fortress (Trebević Fortress) Must See

Kravice Waterfalls Top Pick

Spectacular 25-meter waterfalls in southern Bosnia, about 2.5 hours from Sarajevo, surrounded by lush limestone cliffs and natural pools perfect for swimming. The scenic walking paths and picnic areas make this ideal for nature enthusiasts and photographers. The emerald-green water creates an almost surreal natural swimming pool experience.

Tips for Day Trips & Excursions

- Rent a car or join organized day trips for southern destinations
- Mostar can get crowded—visit early morning for better experience

Practical Information

Seasonal Guide

Spring (April-May) offers mild temperatures (15-20°C), blossoming flowers, and perfect conditions for exploring the city's outdoor attractions. The weather is pleasant without excessive heat, making it ideal for walking tours of Baščaršija and nearby parks.

Summer (June-August) brings warm, sunny weather (20-28°C) perfect for outdoor activities. However, this peak tourist season means crowded attractions and higher prices. The long daylight hours allow extended sightseeing.

Autumn (September-October) is considered the best season—pleasant temperatures (12-20°C), golden foliage, reduced crowds, and clear skies. It's excellent for both cultural exploration and outdoor activities without summer heat or winter precipitation.

Winter (November-March) can be cold and rainy, though snow occasionally blankets nearby mountains. While fewer tourists mean more authentic experiences and lower prices, many outdoor activities become limited. Perfect for travelers seeking to experience Sarajevo's local life rather than tourist attractions.

Getting Around Sarajevo

Public Transportation: The city offers an efficient tram (streetcar) system and comprehensive bus network. Purchase single tickets (~1.80 KM) or day passes from kiosks. Trams are scenic, reliable, and preferred by locals for navigating the city.

Arrival: Sarajevo International Airport (SJJ) serves flights from major European cities. Direct buses to the city center cost around 15 KM. International buses connect to neighboring countries. The train station links Sarajevo to regional destinations.

Taxis & Rideshare: Taxis are plentiful and affordable, approximately 2-3 KM per kilometer. Agree on fares beforehand with traditional taxis. Uber operates in Sarajevo and offers transparent pricing.

Walking: The city center is quite walkable. The Old Town is best explored on foot—narrow cobblestone streets make cars impractical anyway.

Day Trips: Car rental is worthwhile for visiting nearby Mostar, Medjugorje, and Kravice Waterfalls. Organized bus tours also depart from the city center.

✈️ Airport Transfer

Sarajevo International Airport (SJJ) to city center:

- **Centrotrans Airport Bus:** Runs roughly every 30-60 minutes to the main bus station in about 20 minutes, tickets cost around 5 KM



- **City Bus Line 32:** Public transit option to the city center taking about 25-30 minutes, tickets cost around 2 KM
- **Taxi:** Metered ride to Baščaršija or the city center in about 15-20 minutes, typically costs 15-25 KM
- **Private Transfer:** Pre-booked car or minivan direct to your hotel in about 15-20 minutes, prices generally range from 20-30 EUR

Shopping & Souvenirs

Traditional Items: Copper handicrafts, intricately carved wooden boxes, authentic Turkish coffee sets, handwoven textiles, and Islamic calligraphy represent authentic Sarajevo souvenirs found throughout Baščaršija's traditional shops.

Shopping Districts: Baščaršija is the heart of traditional shopping with family-run shops offering authentic crafts. Ferhadija Street provides modern shopping with international brands and contemporary boutiques. Local markets offer produce and daily necessities at authentic prices.

Bargaining Culture: Negotiating prices is expected in Baščaršija and markets, particularly for larger purchases. Begin at 20-30% below asking price and gradually work toward agreement—bargaining is enjoyed as part of the social transaction.

Hours: Most shops operate 9 AM-8 PM weekdays, with reduced hours Sundays. Tourist-oriented shops stay open late during peak season. Plan shopping accordingly to avoid disappointment.

Prices: Souvenirs typically cost 10-50 KM depending on item and quality. Quality handmade items command premium prices but offer unique authenticity unavailable in mass-produced tourist goods.

Annual Events & Festivals

Sarajevo Film Festival (August): One of Europe's most prestigious film events attracting international filmmakers, celebrities, and enthusiasts for over a week of screenings, premieres, panel discussions, and cultural performances. The festival energizes the city with cinematic celebration and cultural dialogue.

Baščaršija Summer Nights (July-August): Evening performances featuring traditional music, contemporary theater, comedy, and cultural exhibitions throughout the Old Town. This open-air festival creates vibrant evening atmosphere, drawing locals and visitors alike.

Winter Festival (December-January): Christmas and New Year festivities include Christmas markets, ice skating rinks, live concerts, holiday decorations, and family activities transforming Sarajevo into a festive winter destination.

Sarajevo Biennale (Odd Years): International contemporary art exhibition featuring installations, performances, multimedia works, and artist talks across multiple venues, showcasing cutting-edge artistic expression.

Islamic Holidays: During Ramadan and Eid celebrations (dates vary yearly based on lunar calendar), the city observes altered hours, evening gatherings, and traditional foods. These periods offer authentic glimpses into Islamic practice and Bosnian culture.

New Year Celebration (December 31-January 1): Street parties, fireworks, live performances, and family gatherings create festive atmosphere throughout the city celebrating the new year.

5-Day Sample Itinerary

Day 1 - Ottoman Sarajevo: Morning: Explore Baščaršija with its narrow winding streets, traditional shops, and workshops. Lunch: Sample čevapčići at a traditional eatery in the old town. Afternoon: Visit Sebilj Fountain, browse copper workshops, experience Turkish coffee ritual. Evening: Dinner at a riverside restaurant with city views.

Day 2 - Museums & Heritage: Morning: National Museum to view the Sarajevo Haggadah and extensive cultural collections. Lunch: Casual café near the museum. Afternoon: War Tunnel Museum offering historical context of the siege. Evening: Walk the riverside promenade at sunset, reflecting on the city's complex history.

Day 3 - Religious & Architectural Diversity: Morning: Visit Gazi Husrev-bey Mosque and attached bazaar understanding Ottoman architecture. Midday: Cathedral of Jesus the Saviour showcasing Orthodox heritage. Afternoon: Jewish Museum and Ashkenazi Synagogue. Evening: Optional interfaith tour learning about coexistence traditions.



Day 4 - Nature & Views: Morning: Tram to Vrelo Bosne spring for nature walk and traditional restaurant lunch. Afternoon: Chairlift to Kovačici viewpoint enjoying panoramic city and mountain vistas. Evening: Explore modern downtown area with contemporary restaurants and cafés.

Day 5 - Day Trip to Mostar: Early morning: Bus journey to Mostar. Morning: Experience iconic Stari Most bridge and surrounding Ottoman architecture. Lunch: Traditional Mostar cuisine. Afternoon: Explore riverside cafés, watch bridge divers tradition, visit local shops. Evening: Return to Sarajevo, relax, prepare for departure.

Baščaršija Streets: Narrow cobblestone passages, traditional architecture, craftspeople at work create atmospheric street photography. Visit early morning for soft light and fewer tourists. Evening creates dramatic shadows between buildings.

Ferhadija Street at Evening: Street performers, busy cafés, glowing shop windows create vibrant urban scenes. Twilight hour captures both artificial and natural light, creating dramatic street photography.

Voltage & Frequency: Bosnia uses 230 volts AC at 50 Hz frequency, standard throughout Europe. Most modern devices with voltage conversion (check if 100-240V) will work without adapters.

Plug Types: Type C (two round pins) and Type F (two round pins with earth clips) are standard. These are the same plugs used throughout continental Europe. Bring adapters if traveling from UK, US, Australia, or other regions using different standards.

Adapter Recommendations: Universal travel adapters accommodating multiple plug types provide convenient solution. They're widely available and inexpensive. Most hotels provide adapters if you request them.

Reliability: Power supply is reliable in the city center and modern areas. Occasional outages occur in some neighborhoods during winter months. Carrying a power bank for devices provides backup security.

Where to Buy: Electronic shops in downtown Sarajevo and airports stock adapters and universal plugs if you arrive unprepared.

Bosnian Cuisine & Dining Culture

Must-Try Dishes: *Čevapčići* (grilled seasoned meat rolls served with flatbread and onions), *Ćevapi* (ground meat skewers), *Burek* (phyllo pastry filled with meat, cheese, or spinach), *Sarma* (cabbage rolls filled with rice and meat), *Pita* (savory pie with various fillings), *Baklava* (honey-soaked pastry with nuts), and *Tufahija* (poached apples with walnut stuffing).



Bosnian Coffee Ritual: Strong coffee served in small cups accompanied by sweets represents Sarajevo hospitality. Spending time over coffee is a social activity, not a rushed caffeine boost. Local coffee shops are gathering spaces where conversations extend for hours.

Dining Hours & Culture: Lunch occurs 12-3 PM, dinner 8 PM onwards. Meals are leisurely social experiences. Tipping 5-10% is customary for good service but not mandatory. Family-style dining sharing multiple dishes is traditional.

Restaurant Recommendations: Baščaršija traditional restaurants offer authentic atmosphere with family recipes. Modern downtown restaurants present contemporary interpretations of Bosnian cuisine with international influences. Street food stands provide quick, affordable čevapčići and pita.

Pricing: Budget meals at local eateries cost 5-12 KM (~2.50-6 EUR). Mid-range restaurants 15-25 KM. Tourist-area and fine dining establishments 30+ KM. Drinks slightly more expensive than food.

Tourist Passes

Sarajevo City Card

A tourist pass offering discounts at museums, restaurants, shops, and attractions throughout Sarajevo. Available for 24, 48, or 72-hour periods, the card provides cost savings (typically 20-30% discounts) for visitors planning to visit multiple attractions. Includes free/discounted public transportation depending on version purchased.
