Things to do in Paphos

Ancient & Historical Sites

Paphos is home to some of the Eastern Mediterranean's most significant archaeological treasures, where Greek mythology and Roman civilization intersect. These ancient sites transport visitors back thousands of years to when Aphrodite herself was said to have emerged from the sea.



Paphos Archaeological Park Must See

A UNESCO World Heritage site containing remains from Hellenistic through Medieval periods. The site features stunning Roman mosaics, a Greco-Roman theater, and the Asclepeion (healing temple). Tombs of the Kings Must See

Impressive rock-hewn Hellenistic tombs dating to the 4th century BCE, carved directly into limestone cliffs. These underground chambers feature Doric columns and descending staircases. Despite their name, they housed wealthy families rather than royalty. The site offers panoramic views of Paphos Bay and includes a small museum.

Kato Paphos Harbor & Venetian Castle Top Pick

The picturesque harbor features a restored 16th-century Venetian fortress overlooking fishing boats and waterfront tavernas. The castle, rebuilt by the Ottomans, houses a small museum with nautical artifacts and provides 360-degree views of the Mediterranean. The surrounding area is filled with charming restaurants and shops perfect for sunset strolls.

Mosaics of Villa of Dionysos Top Pick

Spectacular Roman villa containing some of Cyprus's finest mosaics from the 2nd-3rd centuries CE. The floor decorations depict scenes of hunting, feasting, and mythological tales including Dionysos himself. The preservation quality allows visitors to appreciate the intricate detail and artistic skill of ancient Roman craftsmen.

Tips for Ancient & Historical Sites

- Purchase a combined ticket for archaeological sites for better value
- Visit early morning to avoid crowds and heat
- Bring sun protection and water; many sites have limited shade



- The archaeological museum complements site visits perfectly



Religious Sites

Cyprus has deep Christian roots dating to the apostolic period. Paphos region holds significant religious heritage including traditional Byzantine churches and pilgrimage destinations central to Orthodox Christianity.

Church of Panagia Chrysopolitissa

Byzantine church built over the site where St. Paul was imprisoned before his trial. The interior features beautiful mosaics and icons. Adjacent to the church stands an ancient Roman pillar traditionally said to be where Paul was flogged. The church remains an active pilgrimage destination and working place of worship.

Agia Kyriaki Catacombs

Agia Solomoni Church

Tips for Religious Sites

- Dress modestly when visiting active churches; cover shoulders and knees
- Many churches have specific visiting hours; check in advance
- Photography inside churches may be restricted; always ask permission
- Respect worship times and ongoing services

Paphos museums preserve and display Cyprus's rich cultural heritage from prehistoric times through the modern era, offering comprehensive insights into island life across millennia.

Tips for Beaches & Coastal Areas

- Mediterranean sun is intense; use high SPF sunscreen and reapply frequently
- Peak season (June-August) beaches are crowded; visit early morning or late afternoon
- Water temperature is warmest July-September; coldest January-March
- Bring water shoes for rocky beaches and when entering water over rocks



- Check turtle nesting season restrictions before visiting Lara Beach

Tips for Tours & Activities

- Book water activities through established operators with safety certifications
- Bring waterproof sunscreen and protective rash guard for water sports
- Sea conditions are calmest morning hours and May-September
- Diving certification required for unsupervised diving; obtain before arrival if possible
- Seasickness medication recommended for those prone to motion sickness

Paphos serves as an excellent base for exploring diverse destinations across western Cyprus, from mountain villages to nature reserves and alternative beaches, all reachable within 1-2 hours.

Akamas Peninsula Nature Reserve Must See

Tips for Food & Dining

- Dinner service begins around 8pm; restaurants are quieter before 7pm
- Ask server for house recommendations rather than ordering unknowns
- Cash payment often receives discounts at traditional tavernas
- Ordering multiple dishes to share is the traditional Cypriot way
- Service charge is often included; tips of 5-10% appreciated but optional

Practical Information

When to Visit Paphos

Best Overall: April-May and September-October offer ideal weather (22-28°C), fewer crowds than summer, and comfortable conditions for sightseeing. Sea temperatures are warm enough for swimming.

Summer (June-August): Temperatures reach 30-35°C with intense sun. Beaches are crowded with international tourists. Accommodation prices peak. Best for water sports and night activities. Not ideal for extensive historical site visits due to heat and crowds.

Winter (December-February): Mild temperatures (12-16°C) with occasional rainfall. Tourist infrastructure operates with reduced hours. Weather unpredictable. Suitable for hiking and avoiding crowds, but beach activities are limited.



Spring & Fall: Perfect balance of comfortable weather, moderate crowds, reasonable accommodation prices, and full facility availability. Most visitors discover these seasons optimal for overall Paphos experience.

Getting Around Paphos

Car Rental: Most flexible option for exploring multiple sites and regional day trips. International driving permit recommended. Roads are generally well-maintained. Parking available at most attractions. Rental companies throughout city center.

Public Buses: Affordable local bus network serving main areas. Buses operate on schedules with longer waits during off-season. Routes connect beaches, town center, and nearby villages. Purchase tickets onboard or at terminal.

Taxis: Readily available; negotiate rates before entering or use metered taxis. Reliable for specific destinations but more expensive than buses for multiple trips.

Walking: Kato Paphos harbor area is walkable with shops, restaurants, and archaeological sites within comfortable distance. Old town features narrow pedestrian streets ideal for exploration on foot.

Organized Tours: Hotels arrange guided coach tours to major sites and day-trip destinations. Convenient for travellers without rental cars; guides provide historical context.

➔ Airport Transfer

Paphos International Airport (PFO) to city center:

- **Airport Bus (Route 615):** Runs several times daily to Paphos town center and Kato Paphos harbor in about 30 minutes, tickets cost around 4 euros
- **Taxi:** Metered taxis take roughly 15-20 minutes to Kato Paphos and cost approximately 25-35 euros
- **Private Transfer:** Pre-booked shuttle or minivan to hotels in Paphos or Coral Bay takes about 20-30 minutes and costs around 30-50 euros per vehicle
- **Rental Car:** Several agencies operate airport desks, with compact cars available from about 25 euros per day plus a 15-minute drive into town

What to Buy & Where

Local Handicrafts: Visit Lefkara for traditional handmade lace ("lefkaritika") and silverware. Paphos old town features shops selling local crafts, ceramics, and textiles. Ethnographic museums often have quality artisan products.

Cypriot Wines: Purchase local varieties at duty-free shops, traditional wineries, or local markets. Commandaria dessert wine and modern productions make excellent gifts. Wineries offer competitive prices compared to retail shops.

Food Products: Markets sell halloumi cheese, olive oil, dried herbs, and traditional sweets. Local honey, Cyprus coffee, and traditional delicacies available at covered markets and specialty shops. Peak freshness found at morning farmers markets.

Souvenirs: Paphos features numerous souvenir shops along waterfront and near archaeological sites. Quality varies; seek recommendations from hotel staff for authentic, well-made items. Avoid mass-produced items from casual tourist shops.

Markets & Bazaars: Covered market in Paphos old town operates primarily mornings. Friday/Saturday farmers markets in surrounding towns offer fresh produce and local goods. Bargaining expected in traditional bazaars.

Annual Events & Celebrations

Anthestiria Festival (March): Spring celebration featuring flower displays, cultural performances, and local food stalls throughout Paphos. Family-friendly festivities celebrating seasonal renewal.

Easter (April): Cyprus observes Orthodox Easter with religious processions, traditional meals, and cultural celebrations. Paphos witnesses processions and church ceremonies. Preparation period sees special food preparations and community activities.



Kataklysmos Festival (May/June): "Drowning Festival" celebrates end of Easter season. Paphos waterfront features parades, water activities, folk dancing, and food celebrations. Ancient tradition with modern community participation.

Paphos Culture Month (September-October): Month-long celebration featuring international performers, theatrical productions, dance, art exhibitions, and film screenings. Venues throughout Paphos host diverse programming.

Aphrodite Festival (June): International opera and classical music festival held at Paphos Castle and archaeological sites. World-class performers in spectacular historic venues. Advance booking essential.

Christmas & New Year: December features festive decorations, carol concerts, holiday markets, and special dining events. New Year celebrations continue through early January with community gatherings.

Sample Day Itineraries

Day 1: Ancient Paphos Heritage

Morning (8am-11am): Visit Tombs of the Kings, explore rock-hewn chambers and bay views. Lunch (11:30am-1pm): Waterfront taverna in Kato Paphos. Afternoon (2pm-5pm): Explore Paphos Archaeological Park, view Roman mosaics and Greco-Roman theater. Late afternoon (5pm-7pm): Stroll harbor, browse shops and galleries. Dinner (8pm): Fish restaurant with sea views.

Day 2: Beaches & Water Activities

Dinner (8:30pm): Traditional Cypriot restaurant.

Day 4: Mountain Villages & Regional Culture

Early morning (7am): Drive to Troodos mountain region. Morning (9am-12pm): Explore Omodos village, visit monastery, taste local wine. Lunch (1pm-3pm): Traditional mountain taverna. Afternoon (3pm-5pm): Drive to Lefkara village, observe lace-making artisans, shop for handicrafts. Return (6pm-7pm): Coastal drive back to Paphos. Dinner (8pm): Rest and casual meal.

Day 5: Adventure & Nature

Morning (7:30am): Drive to Akamas Peninsula. Hiking (9am-12pm): Scenic peninsula trails through pine forests toward coastal views. Lunch (1pm-2:30pm): Picnic or simple village eatery. Afternoon (3pm-5:30pm): Beach exploration, swimming in isolated cove. Return (6pm-7:30pm): Drive back to Paphos. Dinner (8:30pm): Casual celebration dinner of activities completed.

Best Instagram & Photography Locations

Paphos Harbor & Venetian Castle (Golden Hour Best): The illuminated fortress reflected in calm harbor waters during sunset (7pm-8pm September-October) creates iconic Mediterranean imagery. Morning light (7am-9am) captures fishing boats and activity. Dramatic stone castle architecture and harbor activity provide composition variety.

Tombs of the Kings at Sunset: Limestone cliffs carved with ancient chambers glow orange-pink during golden hour (7pm-8pm). The archaeological site's grand scale and dramatic geology create powerful landscape photos. Clear evening skies provide excellent background contrast.

Coral Bay Beach Panorama: Turquoise bay waters framed by rocky limestone outcrops and sandy beach create postcard-perfect Mediterranean scenes. Sunrise (6:30am-7:30am) captures soft light and fewer visitors. Drone photography captures bay's geometric perfection.

Akamas Peninsula Cliffs: Dramatic white limestone cliffs plunging into blue Mediterranean offer breathtaking coastal photography. Late afternoon light (5pm-7pm) illuminates cliff faces and creates long shadows. Telephoto lenses compress scale, emphasizing cliff grandeur.



Lover's Cove at Sunrise: Secluded white-sand cove framed by dramatic cliffs makes intimate sunrise photography (6:30am-7:30am) particularly striking. Small number of visitors at dawn allows access to prime composition points. Water clarity enables underwater and beach combination shots.

Paphos Old Town Streets: Narrow winding alleys with white-washed buildings, potted plants, and natural lighting create authentic Mediterranean village aesthetic. Early morning light (7am-9am) and late afternoon (5pm-7pm) avoid harsh midday shadows. Details like doorways, windows, and architectural elements provide strong compositional subjects.

Power & Electrical Standards

Voltage & Frequency: Cyprus uses 230 volts, 50 Hz alternating current. Standard is significantly higher than North American (120V) but similar to European standards.

Plug Types: Cyprus primarily uses three rectangular pin design (Type G/British standard) and occasionally Type F (Schuko, two round pins). Older buildings may feature Type D (three round pins in triangular configuration).

Adapters & Converters: Travelers from North America require voltage converters (transformers) for appliances designed for 120V, plus plug adapters. European visitors typically only need plug adapters. Universal multi-standard adapters widely available at airports and electrical shops.

Appliance Compatibility: Modern electronics including phones, laptops, and cameras feature universal voltage input (marked "100-240V") requiring only plug adapters. Hair dryers, electric razors, and heating appliances require voltage converters or replacement with local 230V models.

Grounding: Most accommodations provide properly grounded outlets. USB charging stations increasingly common in hotels, restaurants, and public spaces for device charging.

Cypriot Cuisine & Must-Try Dishes

Meze: Traditional appetizer platters feature multiple small dishes: saganaki (fried cheese), dolmades (grape leaves), tzatziki (yogurt dip), hummus, olives, and bread. Meze represents the heart of Cypriot dining culture and social tradition.

Halloumi: Cyprus's famous cheese, traditionally grilled or fried until the exterior firms while interior softens. Served with watermelon or as appetizer. Fresh halloumi eaten immediately after purchase offers best flavor and texture.

Souvlaki & Kebab: Grilled meat skewers typically featuring pork, chicken, or lamb, served with pita bread, grilled vegetables, and traditional sauce. Street food and restaurant staple throughout Paphos.

Fish & Seafood: Fresh Mediterranean catch grilled simply with lemon and olive oil. Octopus (htapodi), sea bream (tsinari), and grouper are particularly excellent. Early-morning market purchases ensure peak freshness and reasonable pricing.

Commandaria Wine: Sweet red wine from mountain vineyards offers distinctive Cypriot experience. Traditionally sipped after meals or paired with cheese and nuts. 5,000-year winemaking tradition represented in modern and traditional varieties.
