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Things to do in Cannes

Landmarks & Monuments

Iconic structures and historical monuments that define Cannes' architectural heritage and international prestige.



Must See

Palais des Festivals et des Congrès

45 minutes No Booking Needed



Map

The iconic home of the **Cannes Film Festival**, this modernist palace is instantly recognizable by its distinctive red carpet and grand staircases. Built in 1982, it hosts the world's most prestigious film festival each May. The building's exterior features the famous red steps where celebrities arrive. Visitors can admire the architecture from outside or book guided tours during festival off-season to explore the interior halls and learn about cinema history.



Top Pick

Croisette Tower (Tower of Siracusa)

15 minutes No Booking Needed



Map

A historic fortified tower dating to the 15th century, this defensive structure once protected Cannes harbor from pirate raids. Located along the famous Croisette promenade, the tower blends into the modern beachfront yet maintains its medieval character. It's a distinctive landmark that marks a key historical point along the waterfront and offers insight into Cannes' maritime past.



Notable

Castrum Rocher (Old Town Gates)

20 minutes No Booking Needed



Map

Ancient defensive structures dating back to medieval Cannes, the gates of the old fortress (Castrum) still stand as testament to the city's strategic importance. Located near the harbor, these weathered stone gates mark the entrance to the charming old town. They represent the remaining architecture from when Cannes was a fortified settlement. The gates are free to view and provide photo opportunities with historical context.

Tips for Landmarks & Monuments

- Visit the Palais in spring for film festival atmosphere
- Old gates are best photographed in late afternoon light
- Combine tower viewing with a Croisette beach walk
- Festival period (May) offers special exhibitions and building access



Museums & Galleries

World-class art collections and cultural institutions showcasing contemporary and classical works.



Must See

Musée de la Castre

2 hours No Booking Needed



Map

Housed in the elegant 12th-century castle overlooking Cannes harbor, this museum displays Mediterranean antiquities, ethnographic objects, and ancient artifacts. The collection spans Egyptian, Greek, and Roman periods, alongside modern art exhibitions. The building itself is a marvel with period architecture and stunning harbor views from the terrace. The castle's medieval towers and gardens complement the museum experience beautifully.



Top Pick

Espace du Cinéma

1.5 hours No Booking Needed



Map

Dedicated to cinema history and the Cannes Film Festival, this exhibition space showcases memorabilia, posters, photographs, and artifacts from festival editions spanning decades. Visitors learn about iconic films, legendary actors, and behind-the-scenes moments. Interactive displays and documentary screenings bring cinema history to life in an immersive environment perfect for film enthusiasts.



Notable

Galerie de l'Imaginaire

1 hour No Booking Needed



Map

A contemporary art gallery featuring works by international artists with focus on modern and abstract creations. The intimate gallery space showcases rotating exhibitions of paintings, sculptures, and mixed media. Located in a restored period building near the harbor, it offers a refined cultural experience away from tourist crowds. Perfect for art enthusiasts seeking authentic local galleries.

Tips for Museums & Galleries

- Musée de la Castre offers best views at sunset
- Gallery hop on Thursday evenings for special openings
- Check festival schedules for special cinema exhibitions
- Combine museum visits with harbor-side dining



Religious Sites

Sacred spaces and religious architecture reflecting Cannes' spiritual heritage and architectural tradition.



Top Pick

Église Notre-Dame d'Espérance

30 minutes No Booking Needed



Map

This charming Baroque church in the old town dates to the 17th century and features elegant bell tower with distinctive faience tile dome. The interior contains beautiful wooden altarpieces and religious artwork. The church maintains active parish functions while welcoming respectful visitors. Its position in the narrow old town streets makes it an atmospheric discovery during explorations of Cannes' historic quarter.



Top Pick

Chapel of Lérins Abbey (on Île Sainte-Marguerite)

2 hours (including ferry) No Booking Needed



Map

Located on an island just offshore, this medieval chapel is part of a historic monastic complex dating to antiquity. The abbey served as spiritual center for monks for centuries. Though partly ruined, the remaining structures offer insight into religious monastic life. Accessible by short ferry ride, the chapel combines spiritual significance with island adventure and panoramic Mediterranean views.



Notable

Russian Orthodox Cathedral (Cannes-la-Bocca)

45 minutes No Booking Needed



Map

A stunning example of Russian Orthodox architecture in the Cannes-la-Bocca district, this cathedral features distinctive onion domes characteristic of Russian religious design. Built in the early 20th century for the Russian community, it combines Old World elegance with Mediterranean surroundings. The cathedral's ornate interior decoration and traditional Orthodox aesthetics create a unique cultural landmark on the French Riviera.

Tips for Religious Sites

- Respect prayer times and dress codes when visiting active churches
- Ferry to Lérins Abbey departs from the harbor daily
- Orthodox Cathedral services are occasionally open to visitors
- Combine island chapel visit with beach time



Squares & Streets

Vibrant public spaces and charming thoroughfares that form the living heart of Cannes.



Must See

Boulevard de la Croisette

2 hours (to walk entire length) No Booking Needed



Map

The **world-famous waterfront promenade** stretching 2 kilometers along Cannes' best beaches. Lined with luxury hotels, designer boutiques, sidewalk cafés, and palm trees, it epitomizes French Riviera elegance. The Croisette hosts the film festival's red carpet, yacht shows, and daily traffic of celebrities and travelers. Its wide sandy beaches offer swimming and sunbathing year-round, while the promenade provides unbeatable people-watching opportunities.



Top Pick

Rue d'Antibes

1.5 hours No Booking Needed



Map

Cannes' premier shopping street running parallel to the Croisette, this bustling pedestrian thoroughfare features flagship stores of luxury brands alongside local boutiques, cafés, and restaurants. The avenue combines high-end fashion with authentic French shopping culture. Perfect for both serious shoppers and casual browsers, it captures the essence of Côte d'Azur retail experience with tree-shaded walkways and vibrant energy.



Top Pick

Place Forville

1 hour No Booking Needed



Map

Historic marketplace square in the old town, Place Forville buzzes with morning vendors selling fresh produce, flowers, seafood, and local specialties. The arcaded buildings surrounding the square date to the 18th century, creating atmospheric Mediterranean character. Afternoon conversions transform it into an artisan market and social gathering spot. It's an authentic slice of Cannes life, beloved by both locals and visitors seeking genuine French market culture.

Tips for Squares & Streets

- Early morning ideal for Croisette photos with fewer crowds
- Shop Rue d'Antibes before 8 PM when stores close
- Forville market best visited before noon for fresh produce
- Evening Croisette walks offer romantic ambiance

Must See

Le Suquet (Old Town)

2 hours No Booking Needed



Map

The historic heart of Cannes, this medieval quarter features narrow winding streets, colorful buildings, and steep staircases leading upward. Charming restaurants and galleries nestle between traditional Provençal architecture. The neighborhood culminates at the castle overlooking the harbor—the Suquet's elevated position offers stunning panoramic views of the Croisette, bay, and Lérins Islands. It's the most atmospheric area for experiencing authentic old-world Cannes charm.



Must See

Croisette District

3 hours No Booking Needed



Map

The modern, glamorous heart of contemporary Cannes, the Croisette District blends luxury hotels, upscale shopping, and vibrant beach culture. This prime waterfront area represents the Cannes most travelers envision—sophisticated, cosmopolitan, and constantly bustling. World-class restaurants, casino, yacht clubs, and exclusive beaches characterize the district. It's the epicenter of film festival activity and celebrity culture on the French Riviera.



Notable

Cannes-la-Bocca

1.5 hours No Booking Needed



Map

A charming residential neighborhood west of downtown Cannes offering quieter, authentic local atmosphere away from tourist zones. This district features Belle Époque villas, parks, and a relaxed pace. The Russian Orthodox Cathedral anchors this culturally rich area with European heritage. Tree-lined streets and neighborhood restaurants reflect genuine Côte d'Azur residential life, making it perfect for travelers seeking quieter experiences.

Tips for Neighborhoods & Districts

- Suquet best explored on foot with sturdy shoes
- Hire local guide for hidden Suquet passages
- Cannes-la-Bocca offers affordable neighborhood restaurants
- Stay in different districts for varied experiences



Parks & Gardens

Top Pick

Jardin de la Croisette

1 hour No Booking Needed



Map

Manicured gardens running alongside the famous Croisette boulevard, featuring Mediterranean vegetation, palm trees, sculptures, and flowering plants. The gardens provide shaded walking paths and rest areas amid the beach hustle. Beautiful in all seasons, the gardens offer peaceful spots for relaxation while remaining steps from beachfront activity. Well-maintained pathways make it accessible for all visitors.



Top Pick

Île Sainte-Marguerite (Island Park)

4 hours (including ferry and exploration) No Booking Needed



Map

A natural island park just offshore, accessible by ferry, featuring Mediterranean pine forests, beaches, and the famous fortress prison. The island preserves pristine nature with marked walking trails through varied ecosystems. Historic Fort Royal dominates the landscape with its museum dedicated to the Man in the Iron Mask legend. Beaches on the island offer cleaner water and fewer crowds than mainland shores.



Notable

Parc de la Touracelle

1 hour No Booking Needed



Map

A peaceful neighborhood park offering playgrounds, walking paths, and green space away from central tourist areas. Children enjoy dedicated play areas while adults appreciate shaded benches and mature trees. The park represents genuine local recreation space where residents gather daily. It's a tranquil spot for picnics, reading, or simply enjoying Mediterranean nature in a low-key setting.

Tips for Parks & Gardens

- Visit parks early morning for peaceful atmosphere
- Bring water and sun protection to island visits
- Ferry schedules vary by season—check ahead
- Ideal for picnic lunch away from tourist restaurants



Fountains & Public Art

Top Pick

Palme d'Or Monument

20 minutes No Booking Needed



Map

A striking sculpture celebrating the Cannes Film Festival's most prestigious award, the golden palm symbol stands prominently in the city center. The monument represents the international recognition Cannes receives through cinema. Beautifully lit at night, it serves as popular photo spot and symbol of Cannes' global cultural significance. The surrounding plaza often hosts temporary art installations during festival season.



Top Pick

Croisette Sculptures

1 hour No Booking Needed



Map

Modern sculptures dotting the Croisette promenade create an open-air gallery experience. Contemporary artworks by established and emerging artists complement the palm-lined walkway. These installations reflect Cannes' commitment to merging high culture with public accessibility. Photography opportunities abound as sculptures frame views of the Mediterranean and yacht-filled harbor.



Notable

Street Art in Le Suquet

1.5 hours No Booking Needed



Map

Vibrant murals and street art pieces decorate the narrow streets and alleyways of the old town, created by both established and street artists. The colorful works add contemporary character to medieval architecture, representing the neighborhood's creative spirit. Casual exploration reveals new pieces constantly being added, making repeat visits worthwhile for art enthusiasts.

Tips for Fountains & Public Art

- Photograph sculptures at sunset for dramatic lighting
- Palme d'Or monument best visited during festival
- Street art tours available in old town
- Check festival calendar for temporary installations

Book Ahead

Lérins Islands Ferry Excursion

4-6 hours Book Ahead

Round-trip ferry service from Cannes harbor to the Lérins Islands (Île Sainte-Marguerite and Île Saint-Honorat) offers natural beauty, historical sites, and aquatic experiences. Ferry rides feature Mediterranean views and marine life spotting. On-island options include beach time, fortress exploration, monastic site visits, and swimming. Multiple ferries daily accommodate varying schedules. Perfect for day trips combining culture, nature, and relaxation.



Must See

Book Ahead

Old Town Guided Walking Tours

2 hours Book Ahead

Professional guides lead small groups through Le Suquet, sharing medieval history, architecture details, and local legends. Tours navigate narrow streets, hidden passages, and viewpoints inaccessible to casual visitors. Knowledgeable commentary reveals Cannes' evolution from fortress town to glamorous resort. Tours typically conclude at harbor viewpoint or local café. Various languages available for international visitors.



Top Pick

Book Ahead

Yacht & Boat Cruises

2-4 hours Book Ahead

Various boat tours explore Cannes coastline, offshore islands, and neighboring Côte d'Azur destinations. Options range from casual harbor cruises to upscale yacht charters, sunset cruises, and private rentals. Knowledgeable guides share maritime and cultural history while passengers enjoy Mediterranean views. Popular routes include Antibes, Golfe-Juan, and island circumnavigations.

Tips for Tours & Activities

- Book ferry tickets morning or for afternoon departures
- Bring swimsuit on island excursions for beach time
- Walking tours depart early morning—wear comfortable shoes

Must See

Antibes

4-6 hours No Booking Needed



Map

Charming coastal town just 15 kilometers from Cannes featuring medieval old town, impressive ramparts, and picasso museum housed in a castle. Antibes balances authentic Provence character with sophisticated beachfront amenities. The historic harbor bustles with fishing boats and yachts. Antibes serves as excellent day trip alternative combining culture, beaches, and dining without Cannes' celebrity tourism intensity.



Must See

Grasse (Perfume Capital)

5-7 hours No Booking Needed



Map

Located just 20 kilometers inland, hilltop Grasse is world-famous perfume capital with centuries of fragrance-making tradition. The old town features narrow medieval streets, artisan perfume shops, and major fragrance houses offering factory tours. Visitor centers explain perfume creation process while shops sell unique scents. Day trips combine cultural immersion, shopping, and charming Provençal atmosphere far from coastal tourism.



Top Pick

Saint-Paul-de-Vence

4-5 hours No Booking Needed



Map

Medieval hilltop village 25 kilometers from Cannes renowned for artistic heritage, galleries, and exceptional panoramic views. Stone ramparts enclose charming old town with narrow streets, artisan shops, and restaurants. Stunning surrounding countryside features lavender fields and vineyards. Famous residents included artists and writers. The village perfectly encapsulates Provence beauty and cultural richness, offering escape from coastal bustle.

Tips for Day Trips & Excursions

- Rent car or use public buses for day trips
- Grasse best visited Tuesday-Friday for factory tours
- Early start allows unhurried exploration
- Saint-Paul-de-Vence more peaceful on weekdays

Bus Network

Varies No Booking Needed

Comprehensive municipal bus network connects all Cannes neighborhoods and surrounding areas with frequent service. The RTL bus system includes city routes and regional connections to nearby towns. Tickets available for single journeys or multi-day passes. Well-marked stops and schedules make navigation simple. Buses offer affordable, accessible transportation with views of local neighborhoods unavailable to tourists staying on Croisette.



Recommended

Taxi & Rideshare Services

Licensed taxis operate throughout Cannes with prominent signage and meter-based fares. Uber and other rideshare apps available for smartphone-based booking. Taxis best for late-night travel, airport transfers, and multiple-passenger groups. Slightly higher cost than buses justified by convenience and direct routing. Major hotels maintain taxi stands for easy access.

Bicycle & Scooter Rentals

Multiple rental services offer bicycles and electric scooters perfect for exploring Cannes at leisure pace. Flat Croisette boulevard ideal for biking, while neighborhoods require more athletic effort. Rentals available hourly or daily with safety equipment provided. Eco-friendly option appeals to environmentally conscious travelers. Self-guided exploration offers flexibility unavailable through organized tours.

Christmas Market

Cannes trades summer glamour for a cosy **Village de Noël** each December, with chalets, an outdoor ice rink and festive lights along the Croisette. For the grandest markets, visitors hop a short train to Nice or Monaco, both under an hour away.



Must See

Village de Noël de Cannes

1-2 hours No Booking Needed



Map

Cannes sets up its own **Christmas village** on the Allées de la Liberté, near the Old Port, from early December through early January 2027. Expect a cluster of wooden chalets selling mulled wine, roasted chestnuts, local honey and handmade gifts, plus a covered **ice-skating rink** that stays busy with families through the school holidays. It is smaller and calmer than the big-city markets in Nice or Strasbourg, which suits Cannes well, *a relaxed evening stroll* rather than a crowded event. Illuminated palm trees along the nearby Croisette add a distinctly Riviera twist to the usual Alpine market scene. Best visited early evening when the lights come on and the chalets are lively but not packed.



Top Pick

La Croisette Holiday Illuminations

45-60 minutes No Booking Needed



Map

Through December 2026, Cannes drapes its famous seafront promenade in **festive lighting**, with illuminated motifs strung along the palm trees and grand hotel facades from the Palais des Festivals to the Port Canto. It costs nothing and takes only an hour to walk end to end, making it an easy add-on before or after dinner. The display is understated compared to Nice's Promenade du Paillon, but the combination of *string lights, sea air and the Bay of Cannes* gives it a distinctly Mediterranean holiday feel unlike inland Christmas markets. Photographers favor the stretch near the Majestic and Carlton hotels, where the lighting is densest. Pair the walk with a coffee at one of the beachfront cafés that stay open through winter.



Notable

Nice Christmas Market (Marché de Noël)

3-4 hours including travel No Booking Needed



Map

A 40-minute train ride from Cannes, **Place Masséna and the Promenade du Paillon** in Nice host the Côte d'Azur's largest Christmas market, typically running from late November through early January 2027. Rows of chalets sell Provençal crafts, santons figurines, socca and vin chaud, alongside a big wheel and an ice rink that draws crowds every evening. It is significantly bigger and busier than anything in Cannes itself, so it suits travelers who want the full market atmosphere rather than a quiet stroll. The Old Town nearby stays lit and lively too, with narrow lanes strung in lights. Trains from Cannes run frequently and the market sits a short walk from Nice-Ville station.





Optional

Monaco Christmas Village

3-4 hours including travel No Booking Needed



Map

About an hour from Cannes by train, Monaco's **Christmas Village** fills Port Hercule with chalets, an ice rink, a Ferris wheel and nightly light shows from early December 2026 into early January 2027. It leans upscale and polished, matching Monaco's character, with artisanal food stalls, a carousel for kids and views over the yacht-lined harbor. The setting against the floodlit Prince's Palace and surrounding hillside makes it one of the more scenic Christmas markets on the coast. It gets crowded on weekends and during the holiday break, so a weekday visit is calmer. Combine it with a walk through Monaco's Old Town, which is also decorated for the season.

Tips for Christmas Market

- Cannes's own market is modest, budget a half day trip to Nice or Monaco for a bigger market atmosphere
- Trains along the coast run frequently and take 30-60 minutes, book a return ticket via SNCF/TER in advance during peak weekends
- Evenings are best for lights and atmosphere, but daytime visits mean fewer crowds at the chalets and rinks
- December weather on the Riviera is mild by European standards, but a coat is still needed after sunset



Nightlife & Entertainment

Once the Croisette lights flick on, Cannes trades its film-festival glamour for a more intimate after-dark scene of champagne bars, casino floors, and jazz-filled cellars tucked behind the Old Town. The crowd here skews polished rather than raucous, with rooftop terraces and beachfront lounges favoring a good cocktail and sea view over a heaving dance floor. Late spring through early autumn is peak season, when terraces stay open well past midnight.



Must See

Casino Barriere Le Croisette

2-3 hours No Booking Needed



Map

Set inside the Palais des Festivals building, this **casino** is where Cannes nightlife gets its glossy edge, with slot machines, roulette and blackjack tables running late into the night. The adjoining Lucky Strike Bar keeps a live pianist or DJ going for guests taking a break from the tables, and the terrace looks straight out over the bay. A more formal gaming room upstairs draws a quieter, higher-stakes crowd, while the main floor stays lively and welcoming to first-timers. Smart-casual dress is expected, and photo ID is required at the door. It pairs naturally with a pre-dinner stroll along the Croisette, since the entrance sits just steps from the beach. Even non-gamblers often drop in for a drink and the buzzy, red-carpet atmosphere the venue is known for.



Must See

Book Ahead

Le Baoli

3-4 hours Book Ahead



Map

A fixture of the Cannes party circuit, **Le Baoli** is a waterfront restaurant-turned-nightclub in Port Pierre Canto that has hosted celebrities and festival afterparties for two decades. Bali-inspired decor, flaming torches and a floating deck set the scene for dinner service that gradually shifts into a full-blown club night, complete with resident DJs and the occasional live percussion act. Tables can be reserved for dinner, but the standing area near the bar and dance floor gets busy from around 1am onward. Dress code leans upscale, and the door can be selective during festival weeks. It is best reached by taxi or a short walk from the marina, and the outdoor setting makes it a favorite through the warmer months when the terrace opens fully to the night air.



Top Pick

Rooftop Bars of Rue Notre-Dame

1-2 hours No Booking Needed



Map

A short row of hotel and restaurant rooftops just back from the Croisette offers some of the best *golden-hour* views in Cannes, with the bay, the Lerins Islands and the hills above town all visible from a single table. Crowds build steadily from sunset, when cocktail menus swap toward espresso martinis and Aperol spritzes and the soundtrack shifts from lounge to upbeat house. Several terraces require a reservation on weekends, though walk-ins can usually find a spot at the bar earlier in the evening. The atmosphere stays relaxed rather than clubby, making it an easy stop before a later night out elsewhere. Light bites and shared plates are typically available alongside the drinks menu, and most venues keep serving until around 1am.





Top Pick

Le Suquet Jazz Cellars

1-2 hours No Booking Needed



Map

Tucked into the stone-vaulted basements of the Old Town, a handful of small jazz clubs keep an intimate, unhurried night scene going away from the Croisette crowds. Local trios and touring musicians play everything from swing to bebop most weekend nights, with candlelit tables and a low ceiling that makes the room feel more like a private session than a show. Wine and simple charcuterie plates are the usual order, and there is rarely a cover charge, though a drink minimum is common. The setting rewards arriving early to grab a table close to the musicians. It is a good match for travelers who want live music without the volume or dress code of the beachfront clubs, and a short uphill walk from the harbor.



Notable

Port Canto Beach Clubs by Night

2-3 hours Book Ahead



Map

By day these are private beach clubs with sunbeds and lunch service, but several along the eastern end of the Croisette near Port Canto convert into open-air lounges after dark through the summer season. Strings of lights, low sofas set in the sand and DJ sets with the Mediterranean as a backdrop give the evenings a relaxed, barefoot-glamour feel distinct from the clubs closer to the Palais. Reservations are recommended for a table, especially on weekend nights, though the bar area is often open to walk-ins. Many host themed sunset sessions or guest DJs during festival periods. It is an easy option for visitors who want music and cocktails without leaving the beachfront, and taxis run regularly back toward the town center.

Tips for Nightlife & Entertainment

- Dress smart-casual or better; several clubs and the casino enforce a no-sportswear policy at the door.
- Reservations matter most during the film festival in May, when door lists tighten and prices climb.
- Bring photo ID for the casino even if you look well over 18, as checks are strict.
- Taxis and rideshares are the easiest way back from Port Canto or Le Baoli late at night, since buses stop running before most venues close.



With Kids

Cannes may be famous for red carpets, but it also delivers a gentle, sun-soaked holiday for younger travelers. Between a vintage carousel, a marine adventure park just down the coast, calm sandy beaches, and a slow-rolling tourist train, families will find plenty to fill the days without a single tantrum over too much walking.



Must See Book Ahead

Marineland Antibes

Full day Book Ahead



Map

A short drive from Cannes, **Marineland** is the region's premier family day trip, combining a marine animal park with an adjoining water park and amusement rides. Children can watch orca and dolphin presentations, walk through shark tunnels, and meet sea lions up close, while older kids gravitate toward the adjoining Aquasplash water slides and Adventure Golf. It is easily a full-day outing, so arriving early and packing swimwear is worth it. *Tickets are best booked online in advance*, since combo passes covering multiple parks on site offer better value than single-park entry. Shaded picnic areas and food stands make it manageable even with very young children, and stroller rental is available at the entrance. Note that summer weekends draw large crowds, so a weekday visit or early arrival is recommended. The park operates seasonally, so hours should always be confirmed before setting out from Cannes.



Top Pick

Le Grand Carrousel Vintage

15-30 minutes No Booking Needed



Map

Right along the seafront promenade near the Palais des Festivals, this beautifully restored **1900-style carousel** is a beloved fixture for young children visiting Cannes. Painted horses, carriages, and classic fairground lighting spin to organ-style music, delighting toddlers and preschoolers while parents relax on a nearby bench. It is inexpensive, requires no advance planning, and works perfectly as a quick reward after a long stroll or as a way to break up a day of sightseeing. The ride itself only lasts a few minutes, but most families end up going around twice. *Evenings are especially charming*, when the lights glow against the darkening sky and the promenade fills with a relaxed, festive energy. There is no shade directly at the carousel, so midday visits in summer are best kept brief. It sits close to public restrooms and ice cream kiosks, making it easy to turn into a longer stop.



Top Pick

Family Beaches with Kids Clubs

2-4 hours No Booking Needed

Cannes' gently sloping, calm-water beaches make for an easy afternoon with younger children, and several stretches offer supervised kids' clubs and shallow paddling zones. Plage du Midi and Plage Gazagnaire, west of the main harbor, are quieter and less glamorous than the central beach clubs but far more practical for families, with soft sand and gradual entry into the sea. Many private beach concessions rent sun loungers with shaded cabanas and offer mini-club programs during the summer season, giving parents a break while children build sandcastles under supervision. **Public beach sections remain free** and are well suited to a simple morning swim before lunch. Lifeguards patrol the main public beaches in high season, and toilet and shower facilities are available nearby. *Sun protection is essential*, as shade is limited outside the paid beach club areas. Renting a paddleboard or pedal boat is an easy add-on for slightly older kids.





Notable

Petit Train Touristique de Cannes

45 minutes - 1 hour No Booking Needed

This road-going tourist train offers a relaxed, narrated loop through central Cannes, giving younger children the thrill of a train ride while covering ground that might otherwise mean a long, tiring walk. Open-air carriages roll gently past the harbor, seafront, and hillside streets, with commentary available for context that adults will appreciate too. It is an easy way to orient a family to the city on the first day of a stay, requiring no booking and only a short wait at the boarding point. **Rides typically run continuously** throughout the day in the warmer months, with departures every twenty to thirty minutes. Seating is limited, so busy midday slots in peak season may mean waiting for the next departure. *It is best enjoyed as a light, low-effort activity* rather than a deep dive into the city's history, and pairs well with an ice cream stop afterward.

Tips for With Kids

- Pack swimwear and sun protection even for a short beach stop — shade is limited outside paid beach clubs.
- Book Marineland tickets online in advance and go early in the day to beat summer crowds.
- Combine the carousel and tourist train into one relaxed morning to avoid overtiring younger children.
- Public restrooms and gelato stands are plentiful along the seafront, useful for quick breaks between activities.



Events Calendar

Cannes keeps a lively calendar well beyond its famous film festival, with music, fireworks, art, and gastronomy events filling the Croisette and old town throughout the year. This 2026 lineup highlights the recurring happenings that let visitors time a trip around a specific celebration.



Must See Book Ahead

Cannes Film Festival Public Fringe

Full day to multi-day Book Ahead

The world-renowned festival transforms the entire waterfront each **May**, with the **2026 edition scheduled for May 12 through May 23**. Though red-carpet screenings require accreditation, the public fringe is where most visitors experience the magic: giant screens on the beach for open-air screenings, autograph crowds along **La Croisette**, and pop-up designer boutiques. Arrive early evening to watch celebrity arrivals from the public viewing areas opposite the Palais steps. Beach clubs host their own themed parties late into the night, and the atmosphere citywide turns electric with paparazzi, film crews, and impromptu street performances. Booking accommodation months ahead is *essential*, as prices multiply several times over during these two packed weeks.

Cannes Lions and Festival Season Kickoff (MIPIM Echoes)

Half day No Booking Needed

Spring in Cannes opens with a run of professional and cultural gatherings that spill into public view along the **Croisette**. In **2026 this stretch runs from March 10 to March 20**, as delegates and film-world visitors fill hotel terraces and pop-up pavilions near the Palais des Festivals. While many sessions are private, the public can enjoy the buzz, harbor-side exhibitions, and evening light shows that accompany the season. Expect elevated restaurant reservations and a noticeable uptick in yacht traffic in the Vieux Port. It is *not* a ticketed festival for tourists, but a great time to soak up the glamour of Cannes preparing for its biggest annual event. Photographers gather at dawn for uncrowded shots of the Palais facade before the crowds arrive later in the day.



Top Pick Book Ahead

Nuits Musicales du Suquet Summer Concert Series

2-3 hours Book Ahead

Each summer the medieval **Suquet** quarter hosts an open-air classical and world-music series in the courtyard of Notre-Dame d'Esperance church. The **2026 run is set for July 8 to July 25**, with evening concerts beginning around sunset against a backdrop of stone towers and sea views. Past editions have featured chamber orchestras, opera singers, and jazz ensembles performing under the stars, drawing both residents and visitors for a more intimate alternative to the beach scene below. Seating is limited on stone tiers, so arriving thirty minutes early secures a good spot. The setting alone, perched above the harbor with lights twinkling on the water, makes this one of the most atmospheric ways to spend a Cannes summer night. Tickets are sold individually per concert date.





Top Pick

Cannes New Year Fireworks on the Croisette

2-3 hours No Booking Needed

Cannes closes the year with a large fireworks display launched from barges anchored off the bay, best viewed from **La Croisette** promenade or the beaches near the Palais des Festivals. The **2026-2027 celebration takes place on the night of December 31 into January 1**, with the main show beginning at midnight after a build-up of music and crowd entertainment from around 10pm. Restaurants along the seafront offer special gala dinners with reserved terrace views, while the promenade itself fills with families and visitors for a free, festive atmosphere. The reflections of the fireworks on the calm winter sea create a particularly striking spectacle. Arrive at least an hour early to claim a spot along the barriers, and expect a lively but good-natured crush of people at the stroke of midnight.



Notable

Fete du Vin et des Terroirs Autumn Harvest Celebration

2-3 hours No Booking Needed

As summer crowds thin, Cannes turns to its autumn food and wine celebration held along the **Allees de la Liberte**. The **2026 dates run from October 3 to October 5**, featuring regional winemakers, olive oil producers, and Provencal cheese makers setting up tasting stalls beneath the plane trees. Live folk music and cooking demonstrations run throughout each day, and local chefs showcase seasonal harvest dishes using produce from nearby Provence. It is a far more relaxed, community-oriented event than the glitzy film festival, appealing to visitors who want a genuine taste of regional culture. Entry to the grounds is free, with a small fee for tastings. Bring a tote bag, as many vendors offer bottles and jars for purchase to take home.

Tips for Events Calendar

- Book hotels 6+ months ahead for the May film festival window, when rates surge citywide.
- Suquet concert seating is stone and unshaded early on, so bring a cushion for comfort.
- The autumn wine festival is a budget-friendly, low-crowd alternative to peak summer visits.
- For New Year fireworks, claim a Croisette viewing spot at least an hour before midnight.

Notable

Marché Gambetta

1 hour No Booking Needed

While Forville draws the tourist crowds, **Marché Gambetta** is where Cannes residents do their daily shopping. This neighborhood market hall sits a short walk from the station and sells the same Provençal produce, cheese, and charcuterie at friendlier prices, with far less bustle. Mornings are liveliest, when stallholders set out socca, tapenade, and seasonal fruit alongside flower vendors. It is a genuine slice of everyday Cannes life, with almost no English spoken and almost no other visitors. Come *early* for the best selection, and expect the hall to wind down by early afternoon. A nearby cluster of unpretentious cafes makes it easy to turn a market visit into a full local morning out.

Notable

La Croix des Gardes Forest Trails

1.5-2.5 hours No Booking Needed

Rising above the western edge of Cannes, **La Croix des Gardes** is a pine and cork-oak forest crisscrossed with quiet walking trails, almost entirely unknown to beach-bound visitors. Paths wind past umbrella pines and old villa gates up to a hilltop cross with sweeping views over the Lérins Islands and the Estérel coastline. It is a favorite of local joggers and dog walkers rather than tourists, so trails stay peaceful even in high season. Several routes loop back down toward residential streets lined with Belle Epoque villas, offering a completely different side of Cannes architecture. Wear proper shoes, as the terrain is uneven in places, and go in the **early morning** for the coolest air and best light over the bay.

Optional

Villa Domergue Gardens

1-2 hours Book Ahead

Tucked into the hillside of La Californie, the **Villa Domergue** is a private Art Deco mansion once home to painter Jean-Gabriel Domergue, whose terraced Italianate gardens occasionally open to the public for exhibitions and events. The cascading pools, cypress-lined terraces, and sweeping bay views feel closer to a Tuscan estate than the beachfront glamour a few minutes away. Because access is limited to scheduled openings, it stays almost entirely off the standard tourist circuit. Even glimpsing the gates and garden walls from the surrounding streets gives a sense of a Cannes rarely photographed. Check current opening dates locally, as the schedule changes *seasonally* and is not always well publicized to visitors.

Optional

Malmaison Art Centre Backstreets

1 hour No Booking Needed

Just off the Croisette itself, the streets immediately behind La Malmaison exhibition hall hold a pocket of independent galleries, artist studios, and small design boutiques that most beach-focused visitors walk straight past. Unlike the boutiques of Rue d'Antibes, these spaces showcase emerging and local artists, with rotating shows that change every few weeks. Wandering here on a weekday afternoon often means having entire galleries to yourself, with owners happy to talk about current work. It is a low-key way to see a creative, un-glossy side of a city best known for film-festival spectacle. Opening hours vary by gallery, so an *afternoon stroll* midweek tends to find the most spaces open.

Tips for Hidden Gems

- Visit Marché Gambetta before 11am, as stalls close early and locals shop earliest



- Check for Villa Domergue open days in advance through the Cannes tourism office rather than showing up unannounced
- Wear sturdy shoes for the Croix des Gardes trails, which are unpaved and can be slippery after rain
- Combine the Malmaison backstreets with a quiet coffee stop, since this area has none of the Croisette's crowds or prices

Practical Information

Best Time to Visit

May (Festival Season): The Cannes Film Festival transforms the city into celebrity and cinema haven. Croisette buzzes with red carpet energy, world premieres, and international film industry presence. Accommodation scarce and expensive; book months ahead.

April & June-September (Peak Season): Mediterranean warmth without excessive crowds. July-August busiest with beach tourism; May and September offer ideal balance of weather and manageable crowds.

November-March (Off-Season): Fewer tourists, lower prices, mild weather. Rain possible but not frequent. December-January coldest but rarely freezing. Excellent for experiencing authentic local Cannes.

Weather Summary: Mediterranean climate with hot, dry summers (25-28°C) and mild winters (8-13°C). Occasional mistral winds from north. Sea swimming possible April-October.

Local & Artisan Goods: Place Forville daily market sells fresh produce, flowers, local specialties. Old town galleries and antique shops offer unique finds. Provence lavender products perfect souvenirs. Local honey, olive oil, and herbs available throughout city.

Perfume: Grasse day trip ideal for perfume purchases; factory outlets offer discounts. Cannes perfume shops stock major brands and local artisans.

Hours: Shops typically open 9 AM-7 PM weekdays, shorter Sunday hours. August often sees holiday closures.
