Metz: A Jewel of Lorraine

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Things to do in Metz

Landmarks & Monuments

Metz is home to iconic structures that showcase centuries of architectural excellence, from Gothic cathedrals to contemporary masterpieces.



Must See

Cathedral of Saint-Étienne

1-2 hours No Booking Needed



Map

A stunning **Gothic masterpiece** dating back to the 13th century, featuring magnificent stained glass windows by Marc Chagall and Jacques Villon. The cathedral's soaring nave and ornate façade make it one of France's most impressive religious structures. The interior is adorned with over 6,500 square meters of stained glass, earning the cathedral the title of having the **highest stained glass proportion** of any church in the world.



Must See

Pompidou Centre Metz (Centre Pompidou-Metz)

2-3 hours No Booking Needed



Map

An architectural wonder opened in 2010, featuring a striking white tent-like roof with hexagonal openings. This contemporary art museum houses rotating exhibitions of modern and contemporary art. The building itself is a **work of art**, designed by Shim-Su Building architects, and offers exhibitions focused on contemporary art, photography, and design.



Top Pick

Place Saint-Louis

1 hour No Booking Needed



Map

The heart of medieval Metz, this picturesque square is surrounded by historic buildings with distinctive yellow and red sandstone façades. Once the location of a 14th-century church that was demolished during the French Revolution, the square now features elegant arcaded galleries and is perfect for leisurely strolls, dining, and people-watching.

Tips for Landmarks & Monuments

- Visit the cathedral early morning to avoid crowds and enjoy better lighting for photography
- The Pompidou Centre is closed on Tuesdays; check exhibition hours before visiting
- Many monuments offer combined tickets for savings



Museums & Galleries

Metz boasts world-class museums showcasing everything from classical art to contemporary installations, offering rich cultural experiences.



Must See

Musée de la Cour d'Or (Museum of the Golden Courtyard)

2-3 hours No Booking Needed



Map

A remarkable museum housed in 18th-century buildings arranged around a golden courtyard (cour d'or). It contains an exceptional collection spanning archaeology, Roman mosaics, medieval sculptures, decorative arts, and paintings. Highlights include **Roman artifacts**, medieval religious objects, and works by artists including Lucas Cranach the Elder and Delacroix.



Top Pick

Musée d'Art Moderne et Contemporain (Modern & Contemporary Art Museum)

2 hours No Booking Needed



Map

Featuring extensive collections of 19th, 20th, and 21st-century art with emphasis on German Expressionism, Cubism, and contemporary works. The museum showcases **over 1,800 artworks** including paintings, sculptures, photographs, and installations. Temporary exhibitions complement the permanent collection.



Top Pick

Arsenal Gallery

1-2 hours No Booking Needed



Map

A contemporary art space housed in a stunning **historic arsenal building**, featuring cutting-edge contemporary art exhibitions, installations, and performances. The venue showcases emerging and established artists with a focus on experimental and innovative work.

Tips for Museums & Galleries

- Many museums offer free entry on first Sunday of the month
- Purchase a Metz museum pass for discounted access to multiple venues
- Late-night museum hours are available during special events



Religious Sites

Sacred spaces reflecting centuries of spiritual devotion and artistic achievement, showcasing remarkable architectural and decorative traditions.



Top Pick

Chapel of the Assumption (Chapelle de l'Assomption)

30 minutes No Booking Needed



Map

A beautiful **17th-century baroque chapel** featuring ornate interior decoration, religious artwork, and historical significance. The chapel demonstrates the architectural style of the Counter-Reformation period with elegant proportions and detailed ornamentation.



Top Pick

Temple Neuf (New Temple/Protestant Church)

45 minutes No Booking Needed



Map

An impressive **neo-gothic Protestant church** built in the 19th century, featuring stunning architectural details, intricate stonework, and a grand interior. The temple showcases Protestant religious art and serves as an active place of worship and cultural venue for concerts and exhibitions.



Notable

Saint-Maximin Church

45 minutes No Booking Needed



Map

An important religious monument featuring **romanesque and gothic elements**, showcasing multiple centuries of architectural evolution. The church contains notable religious artworks and offers insight into Metz's religious heritage through its design and decorative elements.

Tips for Religious Sites

- Many churches offer quiet reflection spaces; respect worship schedules and dress respectfully
- Some churches host organ concerts and special religious services throughout the year
- Photography may be restricted in some areas; always ask permission



Neighborhoods & Districts

Wander through charming neighborhoods where medieval architecture, cobblestone streets, and local culture create an authentic Metzian atmosphere.



Must See

Old Town (Vieux Metz)

2-3 hours No Booking Needed



Map

The medieval heart of Metz featuring **winding cobblestone streets, half-timbered houses**, and historic squares. The Old Town showcases architecture from the 13th-19th centuries with picturesque boutiques, cafés, and restaurants tucked into historic buildings. The charming atmosphere and architectural heritage make it perfect for exploration and photography.



Top Pick

Petite France District

1.5 hours No Booking Needed



Map

A picturesque neighborhood with charming waterfront views along the Moselle River, featuring **historic buildings reflected in water channels**. This area is characterized by traditional architecture, small bridges, and intimate cafés, creating a romantic and atmospheric setting ideal for leisurely walks and local dining.



Top Pick

Imperial Quarter (Quartier Impérial)

1.5 hours No Booking Needed



Map

A fascinating neighborhood showcasing **19th-century German imperial architecture** built during the Prussian occupation (1871-1918). Wide avenues, ornate apartment buildings, and classical monuments characterize this district, offering a unique glimpse into Metz's recent historical periods and urban planning evolution.

Tips for Neighborhoods & Districts

- Wear comfortable walking shoes for cobblestone streets
- Best time to explore is early morning or late afternoon to avoid peak crowds
- Stop at local cafés to observe daily life and enjoy regional specialties
- Many streets are one-way; plan your route accordingly



Parks & Gardens

Serene green spaces offering respite, natural beauty, and leisurely outdoor activities throughout the city.



Top Pick

Les Jardins de la Seille

1-2 hours No Booking Needed



Map

Beautiful public gardens stretching along the Seille River, featuring **manicured flower beds, walking paths, and water features**. The gardens provide peaceful spaces for relaxation, picnicking, and observing local flora. Seasonal plantings offer changing displays throughout the year, making each visit unique.



Top Pick

Esplanade Gardens

1.5 hours No Booking Needed



Map

An expansive public space featuring **open lawns, shade trees, and scenic views** of the city and surrounding landscape. The esplanade is popular for picnics, outdoor events, jogging, and simply enjoying nature. Well-maintained pathways connect various sections of the park.



Top Pick

Parc de la Seille

1-2 hours No Booking Needed



Map

A scenic park following the river's course, offering **riverside walks, picnic areas, and recreational facilities**. The park features diverse landscaping, water features, and connection points to other green spaces, making it ideal for family outings and nature walks.

Tips for Parks & Gardens

- Spring and autumn offer the best weather for garden visits
- Pack a picnic to enjoy in the parks; local markets offer fresh produce and delicacies
- Parks are ideal for photography, especially during golden hour
- Walking paths are well-marked; maps available at information centers



Fountains & Public Art

Artistic installations and water features that add beauty and character to public spaces throughout Metz.



Top Pick

Fountain of the Three Lanterns

20 minutes No Booking Needed



Map

A historic decorative fountain in the city center, featuring **artistic sculptures and water displays**. This iconic fountain has been a focal point of civic life for generations and represents the artistic heritage of Metz's public spaces.



Top Pick

Sculpture Gardens along the Moselle River

1.5 hours No Booking Needed



Map

Collections of **modern and classical sculptures** positioned strategically along the riverbanks, creating an open-air gallery. These art installations reflect contemporary artistic expressions while complementing the natural landscape and historic architecture.

Tips for Fountains & Public Art

- Visit fountains in the evening for beautiful illumination
- Sculpture gardens are best explored on foot without time constraints
- Photography opportunities abound; bring a good camera



Tours & Activities

Guided experiences and interactive activities that provide deeper insights into Metz's culture, history, and attractions.



Must See Book Ahead

Walking Tours of Historic Metz

2-3 hours Book Ahead

Guided tours led by knowledgeable locals exploring **medieval architecture, historical significance, and hidden gems**. Tours typically cover the Old Town, major landmarks, and historical districts with expert commentary on Metz's evolution through the centuries.



Must See Book Ahead

River Cruise on the Moselle

1-2 hours Book Ahead

Scenic boat tours offering **unique perspectives of the city skyline, historic bridges, and riverside architecture**. Cruises provide relaxation while enjoying views of monuments and natural landscapes from the water. Available in various durations with commentary options.



Must See Book Ahead

Cathedral Stained Glass Tours

1.5 hours Book Ahead

Specialized tours focusing on the **cathedral's remarkable stained glass windows by famous artists**. Expert guides explain the artistic techniques, symbolism, and historical context of the extensive glass collection, transforming the visit into an educational art experience.



Top Pick Book Ahead

Cooking Classes & Culinary Tours

3-4 hours Book Ahead

Hands-on experiences learning **traditional Lorraine cuisine, regional recipes, and local food culture**. Classes include market visits, ingredient preparation, and instruction from experienced chefs, concluding with enjoying prepared dishes paired with local wines.

Tips for Tours & Activities

- Book tours in advance during peak season (May-September)
- Many tours offer discounts for groups or advance bookings
- River cruises operate seasonally; check availability before visiting



- Multilingual tours are available for major attractions



Day Trips & Excursions

Must See

Verdun (30 km north)

Full day No Booking Needed



Map

Historic World War I site featuring the **Verdun Citadel and extensive battlefield memorials**. Visitors can explore the underground citadel, visit museums chronicling the brutal 1916 battle, and pay respects at ossuary containing remains of fallen soldiers. The preservation of the battlefield landscape provides poignant historical perspective.



Must See

Nancy (60 km south)

Full day No Booking Needed



Map

Beautiful city showcasing **Art Nouveau architecture, elegant Place Stanislas, and exceptional museums**. Nancy is renowned for its 18th-century urban design, glass art collections, and cultural institutions. The city offers a perfect complement to Metz with different architectural styles and artistic traditions.



Top Pick

Marsal Salt Works (30 km west)

2-3 hours No Booking Needed



Map

Historic salt mining area featuring **open-air salt ponds, medieval salt production techniques**, and museum exhibits explaining the region's salt industry heritage. Visitors can learn about traditional evaporation methods and the economic importance of salt to Lorraine's development.

Mirecourt (50 km south)

Top Pick

Mirecourt (50 km south)

3-4 hours No Booking Needed



Map

Charming medieval town famous for **violin and luthier craftsmanship** spanning centuries. Visitors can observe artisans creating instruments, visit workshops showcasing traditional techniques, and tour museums dedicated to violin-making heritage. Perfect for music enthusiasts and craft admirers.

Tips for Day Trips & Excursions

- Rent a car for maximum flexibility in exploring the Lorraine region
- Public transportation connects Metz to nearby cities; check SNCF schedules
- Combine multiple day trips into a regional tour for efficiency
- Stay overnight in Nancy or Verdun for comprehensive exploration



Christmas Market

Metz hosts one of France's oldest and largest Christmas markets, a tradition dating back centuries and now spread across eight illuminated squares in the historic center. In December 2026, expect wooden chalets, mulled wine, and the golden-stone **Cathédrale Saint-Étienne** transformed by a dazzling light show after dark.



Must See

Marché de Noël de Metz

2-3 hours No Booking Needed



Map

Metz's Christmas market is one of the **oldest and most celebrated in France**, typically running from late November through December 30, 2026 (exact dates confirmed closer to the season by the city). Rather than a single site, it unfolds across eight interconnected locations in the pedestrian core, including Place Saint-Louis, Place de la Comédie, and Place du Forum, each with its own theme, from artisan crafts to regional Lorraine food stalls. Expect roughly 100 wooden chalets selling mulled wine, *bredele* biscuits, and handmade gifts. The market draws over a million visitors each season and is best experienced in the early evening, when the stalls glow against Metz's distinctive yellow limestone architecture. Free to wander, it forms the centerpiece of the city's winter identity.



Top Pick

Place d'Armes Christmas Market and Cathedral Light Show

1-2 hours No Booking Needed



Map

Set directly beside the **Cathédrale Saint-Étienne**, this section of the market is arguably the most photogenic, with chalets ringing the square beneath the cathedral's soaring facade. After nightfall, expect a projected *son et lumière* light show animating the cathedral's stonework, a Metz tradition that pairs with the market's opening weeks in December 2026. Vendors here lean toward gourmet Lorraine specialties: quiche lorraine, foie gras, and warm spiced wine served in collectible mugs. The adjacent cathedral itself is worth stepping into, home to some of the largest stained-glass windows in the world, some by Marc Chagall. Arrive around dusk to catch both the stalls and the illumination at their best.



Notable

Ice Rink at Place de la République

1 hour No Booking Needed



Map

A seasonal **open-air ice rink** is typically installed at Place de la République for the duration of the winter market, offering skating sessions for families and couples through late December 2026. It sits at the edge of the Esplanade gardens, giving skaters a view toward Metz's greenery even in winter, and often runs alongside a small Ferris wheel or carousel nearby. Sessions usually last around an hour and skate rental is available on-site for a modest fee. It is a favorite stop for families visiting the Christmas market chalets, offering a break from browsing to burn off some energy. Check local signage or the tourism office for exact hours, as sessions can vary by day.



Optional

Marché Couvert (Covered Market) Winter Food Hall

45 minutes No Booking Needed



Map

For a warmer, year-round counterpart to the outdoor stalls, Metz's **19th-century covered market hall** near the cathedral takes on a festive atmosphere in December, with local producers selling cheeses, charcuterie, oysters, and mulled cider alongside the regular grocery stalls. It is a good rainy-day or cold-weather alternative to browsing the open squares, and a chance to pick up Lorraine specialties like macarons de Boulay or mirabelle plum preserves as gifts. The building itself, a former bishop's palace, is worth a look for its architecture alone. It typically stays open through the holiday season on its normal market days. Combine a visit here with the nearby cathedral and Place d'Armes chalets for a full winter loop.



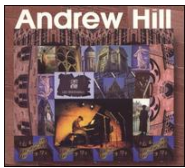
Tips for Christmas Market

- Confirm exact 2026 market dates and hours on the official Metz tourism site closer to your visit, as they shift slightly year to year.
- Visit in the early evening for the best light on both the chalets and the illuminated cathedral.
- Dress warmly and bring cash, as some smaller chalets do not accept cards.
- Weekends and the days just before Christmas draw the largest crowds; weekday afternoons are calmer.



Nightlife & Entertainment

Metz keeps its evenings low-key by day but the historic center around the Moselle comes alive after dark with jazz cellars, Irish pubs, and a converted convent turned concert hall. *Rue Fournirue* and the streets near Place Saint-Jacques form the main bar-hopping strip, while riverside terraces offer a quieter nightcap with views of the illuminated cathedral.



Top Pick Book Ahead

Les Trinitaires

2-3 hours Book Ahead



Map

Housed in a beautifully restored **13th-century convent**, Les Trinitaires is Metz's most atmospheric live-music venue, its vaulted stone cellars hosting jazz, chanson, and world-music acts most nights of the week. The complex includes an intimate cabaret room and a larger concert hall, making it a cornerstone of the city's cultural scene since the 1990s. Expect a mixed crowd of students, locals, and touring musicians, with programming that shifts between acoustic sets and full-band shows. Arrive early to grab a table near the stage, as the medieval architecture means sightlines can be limited once the room fills up. The attached bar serves regional wines and craft beers, and the vaulted ceilings give even a quiet Tuesday show a sense of occasion. Check the schedule ahead, as some evenings sell out.



Top Pick

BAM (Boite a Musiques)

2-4 hours No Booking Needed



Map

Sharing the same historic complex as Les Trinitaires, **BAM** is Metz's go-to spot for electronic, rock, and alternative acts, with a rawer, club-like energy than its jazz-focused neighbor. The stone-vaulted room fills with a younger crowd on weekends when touring DJs and indie bands take the stage, and the standing-room layout keeps things dancing rather than seated. Sound quality is surprisingly strong for a venue built centuries before amplifiers existed. It also functions as an incubator for regional bands, so lineups often mix emerging local acts with more established touring names. The bar pours affordable beer and simple cocktails, keeping the focus on the music rather than fussy drinks menus. Doors typically open in the evening with shows running late, making it a solid anchor for a night out in the old town.



Notable

Republic Pub

1-3 hours No Booking Needed



Map

A firm favorite with expats, students, and rugby fans, **Republic Pub** is Metz's classic Irish-style bar near the city center, pouring a wide selection of draught beers and whiskies in a wood-paneled setting. Big screens show major football and rugby matches, and the atmosphere turns lively during international tournaments, while quieter weeknights suit a relaxed pint with friends. Occasional live acoustic sets and quiz nights add variety to the weekly calendar. The staff are known for being welcoming to solo travelers, and the mixed local-and-visitor crowd makes it an easy place to strike up conversation. It gets busy on weekend evenings, so arriving before 9pm secures a table rather than standing room at the bar. It is a reliable, unpretentious stop for anyone wanting an English-speaking pub experience in the heart of France.





Notable

Rue Fournirue Bar Strip

2-4 hours No Booking Needed



Map

This narrow pedestrian street threading through the medieval core of Metz is the natural starting point for a night out, lined with wine bars, cocktail spots, and casual cafes that spill onto the cobblestones once the sun sets. Locals hop between a handful of favorite addresses here on weekend evenings, sampling regional wines from Lorraine and Alsace alongside classic cocktails. The mix of centuries-old facades and buzzing outdoor seating gives the strip a distinct charm that feels far removed from a typical club district. It is especially pleasant in the warmer months when tables fill the street until late. Because venues sit close together, it is easy to wander and choose a spot based on the crowd and music rather than committing to one bar for the whole evening. Expect a relaxed, sociable vibe rather than a high-energy club scene.



Notable

Riverside Rooftop Lounge

1-2 hours Book Ahead



Map

For a mellower end to the evening, several rooftop and terrace bars along the Moselle offer sweeping views of the illuminated cathedral spire and the river below. These lounges lean toward craft cocktails and small-plate snacks rather than loud music, drawing a slightly older, well-dressed crowd looking for conversation over a nightcap. Sunset is the best time to arrive, when the light catches the sandstone facades of the old town before the city lights take over. Seating is limited on balmy summer nights, so reserving ahead or arriving early is wise. The pace is unhurried, making it a good choice for a date night or a quiet finish after a livelier stop elsewhere. Blankets or heat lamps are often provided in cooler months so the terraces stay open well into autumn.

Tips for Nightlife & Entertainment

- Most bars and clubs cluster within walking distance of the old town, so a night out rarely requires a taxi.
- Book tables at Les Trinitaires and rooftop terraces in advance on weekends, as popular slots fill quickly.
- Public transport slows after midnight, so plan a taxi or rideshare for the trip home.
- Many venues accept card payments only for drinks, but carrying some cash is useful for smaller bars.



Events Calendar

Metz punctuates its calendar with festivals that make the most of its riverside squares, Gothic cathedral, and Centre Pompidou-Metz plaza. From a springtime flower market to a dazzling winter illuminations trail, these recurring happenings give visitors a reason to plan a trip around a specific date.



Must See

Fete de la Mirabelle

Half day No Booking Needed



Map

Metz honors its emblematic golden plum with a lively harvest festival held across the city center, typically running from **August 21 to August 30, 2026**. Expect a fruit and produce market on Place Saint-Louis, a parade with flower-covered floats, live folk and brass bands, and stalls selling mirabelle tarts, jams, and eau-de-vie. The festivities usually close with a fireworks display over the Moselle river, best watched from the Esplanade. It is one of the most distinctly local events in Lorraine, blending agricultural pride with a genuine street party atmosphere. Families, food lovers, and anyone curious about regional traditions will find it worthwhile, and the compact old town setting makes it easy to wander between stalls, cafes, and the cathedral square between performances.



Must See

Marche de Noel de Metz

2-3 hours No Booking Needed



Map

One of the oldest and most atmospheric Christmas markets in France, this event transforms Place Saint-Louis, Place de la Republique, and Place d'Armes into a glowing wonderland from roughly **November 27 to December 30, 2026**. Wooden chalets sell mulled wine, roasted chestnuts, mirabelle liqueur, and handcrafted gifts beneath the illuminated facade of Metz Cathedral. A large ferris wheel and an ice rink add to the festive draw, while an accompanying light show is projected onto Gothic buildings after dusk. It gets busy on weekends and during school holidays, so an early evening visit is recommended for a calmer stroll. Even outside market hours, the surrounding streets stay beautifully decorated, making this one of the best reasons to visit Metz in late autumn or early winter.



Top Pick

Constellations Metz Light Festival

2-3 hours No Booking Needed



Map

Each summer, Metz stages a free nighttime video-mapping and light art trail across its historic monuments, planned for approximately **June 19 to June 21, 2026**. Projections animate the facade of the cathedral, the Opera-Theatre, and buildings along the Moselle with abstract art, music-synced patterns, and storytelling sequences. Visitors follow a self-guided route through the old town after sunset, with shows typically starting around 10:30pm and repeating throughout the evening. It draws large crowds but rarely feels overcrowded thanks to the multiple viewing points spread across the city center. Photographers in particular enjoy the reflections on the river and canals. Wear comfortable shoes, arrive early to grab a good spot at the cathedral square, and check the exact program dates closer to the event since timing can shift with weather.





Notable

Metz en Fete Spring Flower Market

1-2 hours No Booking Needed



Map

To welcome spring, the banks of the Moselle and the Esplanade gardens host a colorful flower and plant market alongside food trucks and live outdoor music, generally scheduled for **May 8 to May 10, 2026**. Local nurseries and artisans set up stands selling seasonal blooms, herbs, and garden decor, while children enjoy face painting and small workshops. The event doubles as an informal celebration of the arrival of warmer weather, with picnic blankets spread across the lawns near the Palais de Justice. It is a relaxed, low-key alternative to the bigger festivals, ideal for a slow Sunday visit. Combine it with a walk through the nearby Jardin Botanique, which is often at its most colorful during this same period, for a full afternoon outdoors.



Notable

Feu de la Saint-Jean and Riverside Concerts

2-3 hours No Booking Needed



Map

Metz marks the summer solstice with a bonfire and concert evening along the Moselle quays, expected around **June 20, 2026**, followed by a series of free open-air summer concerts every weekend through **July and August 2026**. Local bands and touring acts perform on temporary stages near Plan d Eau and the Barrage de Wadrinau, covering genres from jazz to pop. The solstice bonfire itself draws families for an early evening gathering with food stands and acoustic sets before the fire is lit at dusk. Later summer concerts tend to be smaller and more casual, perfect for an evening picnic by the water. Check the tourism office schedule for exact weekend line-ups, as artists and stage locations rotate throughout the season.

Tips for Events Calendar

- Book accommodation well in advance for the Marche de Noel, as it is one of the busiest periods in Metz
- Confirm exact dates on the official Metz tourism site each year, since festival schedules can shift by a week or two
- Arrive early evening for light and fireworks shows to secure a good viewing spot along the Moselle
- Many events are free, but food and drink stalls are cash or card friendly, so bring some euros just in case



Hidden Gems

Beyond the cathedral and Pompidou-Metz, the city hides a quieter layer of medieval gateways, ancient churches and wartime memorials that few visitors ever find. These spots reward a bit of wandering off the main pedestrian routes, from a Roman-era chapel tucked behind the university to a fortified river gate locals cross without a glance. *Give yourself an extra afternoon* to see the Metz that stays off the postcards.



Top Pick

Porte des Allemands (German Gate)

30-45 minutes No Booking Needed



Map

Straddling the Seille river at the eastern edge of the old town, the **Porte des Allemands** is a fortified double gate built in stages from the 13th to 15th centuries, its twin round towers once guarding the road to Germany. Most visitors photograph it briefly on their way elsewhere without realizing they can walk the riverside path beneath its arches or climb up during occasional open-heritage weekends. *The combination of medieval towers rising directly from the water* makes it one of the most photogenic and least crowded spots in the city, especially at dusk when the stone catches the light. Locals use the surrounding streets as a quiet residential shortcut, and a small garden nearby offers a peaceful spot to sit and study the fortifications up close, away from the busier squares near the cathedral.



Top Pick

Saint-Pierre-aux-Nonnains

20-30 minutes No Booking Needed



Map

Saint-Pierre-aux-Nonnains is widely considered one of the oldest church buildings in France, with walls dating back to a 4th-century Roman civil basilica later converted into a monastic chapel. Tucked inside the Esplanade district near the ramparts, it draws a fraction of the visitors that the cathedral does, despite its extraordinary age. The interior is now used as a venue for exhibitions and concerts rather than regular worship, so opening hours vary and it rewards checking ahead. *Standing inside, you can trace masonry layers spanning nearly two millennia* in a single room. Pair a visit with the adjoining Chapelle des Templiers, an octagonal 12th-century Templar chapel just steps away that is equally overlooked and often visited by nobody but a stray student from the nearby campus.



Top Pick

Marché Couvert de Metz (Covered Market)

30-60 minutes No Booking Needed

Set in a former bishop's palace behind the cathedral, the **Marché Couvert de Metz** is a 19th-century covered market where locals still do their weekly shopping among cheese, charcuterie and produce stalls. Visitors who stick to the cathedral square rarely step inside, missing a genuinely local scene with none of the souvenir-shop feel found elsewhere in the old town. Arrive in the morning to see it at its busiest, or grab a coffee and a slice of quiche at one of the small counters tucked between stalls. *Look up at the vaulted stonework* that still hints at the building's ecclesiastical past, a detail most shoppers walk past without noticing. It is an easy, low-cost way to taste Lorraine specialties without booking a formal food tour.





Notable

Fort de Queuleu

1.5-2 hours Book Ahead

On a wooded hill southeast of the center, **Fort de Queuleu** is a 19th-century fortress that became a Gestapo internment site during the Second World War, and today it stands as a somber memorial rather than a polished museum. Guided tours, run mostly by volunteers on select weekends, lead through original cells and interrogation rooms with survivor testimony woven throughout. Almost no tourist itinerary includes it, which is precisely what makes a visit feel genuine rather than staged. *The surrounding earthworks and tree-covered ramparts* are open more freely and make for a reflective walk even outside tour hours. It is a heavier stop than the rest of Metz sightseeing, best suited to visitors interested in twentieth-century history rather than a quick photo opportunity.



Notable

Île du Saulcy and the Plan d'Eau

45-60 minutes No Booking Needed



Map

West of the city center, the **Île du Saulcy** is a river island occupied largely by the university campus, wrapped by a network of footbridges and a wide artificial lake known as the Plan d'Eau. Few sightseers make it this far from the historic core, leaving the shaded paths and lakeside benches to students, joggers and swans. Rowers and small sailing dinghies use the water on weekends, and the surrounding lawns are a favorite spot for locals to picnic in warmer months. *The view back toward the cathedral spire across open water* is one of the best in the city and is almost never crowded. It is a good place to slow down for an hour, especially in late afternoon when the light over the lake turns golden.

Tips for Hidden Gems

- Fort de Queuleu tours run on a limited weekend schedule and fill up, so check the official site before planning your visit around it.
- Saint-Pierre-aux-Nonnains keeps irregular hours tied to whatever exhibition is showing, so confirm access the same day.
- The covered market is quietest right at opening and busiest on Saturday mornings.
- Combine the Porte des Allemands with a stroll along the Seille riverbank rather than just viewing it from the road.

With Kids

Metz has plenty to keep younger visitors entertained beyond its historic core, from riverside green space to a day-trip zoo just outside town. These stops mix outdoor play, hands-on discovery and animal encounters that work well for a family itinerary.

Must See

Zoo d'Amnéville

3-5 hours No Booking Needed



Map

A short drive from central Metz, the **Zoo d'Amnéville** is one of the larger animal parks in the region and a popular full-day outing for families. It is home to big cats, primates, bears, giraffes and a notable collection of birds of prey, with feeding times and keeper talks scheduled throughout the day to keep kids engaged. Paths are stroller-friendly and shaded in most sections, and there are playgrounds and snack stands spread across the grounds so the visit does not need to be rushed. Because it sits just outside Metz, it works well as a half-day or full-day trip paired with lunch in Amnéville itself. Arriving early avoids the busiest midday crowds, especially on weekends and during *school holiday* periods.

Top Pick

Jardin Botanique de Metz (Botanical Garden)

45-90 minutes No Booking Needed

Tucked near the Île du Saulcy, this **botanical garden** is a relaxed spot for families to wander shaded paths, greenhouses and themed plant collections without the crowds of the city center. Kids can run freely on the lawns while parents wander the rose beds and seasonal flower displays, and the site often has *simple play areas* and open grass for picnics. It is small enough to cover in under an hour but varied enough to hold a child's attention, with plenty of insects, ponds and unusual trees to spot along the way. Entry is free and it makes an easy, low-key stop to break up a day of sightseeing, especially in spring and summer when everything is in bloom. Combine it with a walk along the Moselle riverbanks nearby for a longer outdoor outing.

Top Pick

Metz Plage (Urban Beach)

1-3 hours No Booking Needed

Each summer the banks near the Île du Saulcy transform into **Metz Plage**, a temporary urban beach with sand, deckchairs, water games and activities aimed squarely at families. It is a free, festive way to cool off without leaving the city, typically running through July and August with music, sports courts and children's workshops added throughout the season. The atmosphere is relaxed and very local, with picnic spots along the river and shaded areas for younger kids who need a break from the sun. It pairs naturally with a stroll or bike ride along the Moselle promenade, and there is usually a small snack stand or food truck nearby. Check ahead since exact dates and activities shift *slightly* each year depending on the summer program.

Notable

Micro-Folie Metz

30-60 minutes No Booking Needed



Map

Micro-Folie Metz is a small digital museum concept that lets kids explore high-resolution reproductions of famous artworks and cultural treasures through interactive touchscreens and VR-style stations. It is designed to be playful rather than academic, so children can tap, zoom and dig into art and history at their own pace instead of following a fixed tour. Sessions are often short and self-directed, making it an easy stop to slot into a rainy afternoon or between other sightseeing. Staff sometimes run themed workshops for younger visitors, and the format works well for kids who find traditional museums too slow-paced. It is a low-cost, low-commitment way to add a bit of *hands-on culture* to a family day without a long museum visit.

Tips for With Kids



- Pack swimwear in summer if visiting Metz Plage, changing facilities are limited.
- The Zoo d'Amnéville requires a car or short taxi ride and is best tackled as a half-day trip with a picnic or lunch stop.
- Check Micro-Folie's schedule ahead of time, as workshop sessions for kids run at set times rather than continuously.

Practical Information

Best Time to Visit Metz

Spring (April-May): Mild temperatures (12-18°C), gardens in bloom, and fewer crowds make spring ideal. Weather is unpredictable with occasional rain.

Summer (June-August): Warm temperatures (18-25°C), long daylight hours, and numerous events. Tourist season is peak; book accommodations in advance.

Autumn (September-October): Pleasant temperatures (10-16°C), fall foliage in parks, and fewer visitors. Excellent for walking and photography.

Winter (November-February): Cold temperatures (2-6°C) with occasional snow. Fewer tourists, festive Christmas markets (November-December), and indoor attractions are less crowded.

Recommendation: Late spring and early autumn offer the best balance of comfortable weather, manageable crowds, and vibrant atmosphere.

Getting Around Metz

Public Transportation: Efficient tram and bus network operated by TRM covers the city. Day passes and multi-day tickets available at reasonable prices. Trams connect major attractions and neighborhoods.

Walking: The city center is compact and pedestrian-friendly. Most major attractions are within walking distance, especially in the Old Town.

Cycling: Flat terrain and dedicated bike paths make cycling popular. Bike-sharing program 'Metz à Vélo' offers affordable short-term rentals throughout the city.

Taxis & Ride-sharing: Available at the train station and through apps like Uber and local taxi services. Convenient for evening travel.

Arrival: Metz-Nancy Airport (40 km) offers international flights. Train station provides connections to Paris (2.5 hours), Luxembourg, and regional cities.

Parking: Pay parking available in city center; free parking in outer areas. Vehicles are not necessary for exploring central attractions.

➔ Airport Transfer

Metz-Nancy-Lorraine Airport (ETZ) to city center:

- **Airport Shuttle Bus:** Direct service to Metz city center in about 30 minutes, around 9 euros one way
- **Taxi:** Roughly 25 minutes to central Metz, fixed rate around 45 euros
- **Private Transfer:** Pre-booked door to door service in about 25 minutes, from 60 euros
- **Rental Car:** Self drive via A31 motorway reaches Metz center in around 20 minutes



Shopping in Metz

Shopping Districts: Rue Serpenoise and Rue Gambetta feature major brand stores and boutiques. Place Saint-Louis area offers local shops and galleries.

Local Products: Mirabelle plums (liqueur and preserves), Lorraine biscuits, pâté de foie gras, and local pottery make excellent souvenirs. Visit local markets for authentic products.

Markets: Covered market (Marché Couvert) offers fresh produce, cheese, and regional specialties. Weekend farmers' markets in Place de la Cathédrale showcase local vendors.

Shopping Hours: Most shops open 10:00-19:00 Tuesday-Saturday; many close Sunday-Monday. Some stores extend hours during summer and holiday seasons.

Markets & Fairs: Christmas markets (November-December) transform city squares with festive stalls, crafts, and seasonal treats. Summer fairs and art markets occur throughout the year.

Festivals & Events

Christmas Markets (November-December): Festive seasonal markets with decorations, local crafts, mulled wine, and holiday treats at Place de la Cathédrale and surrounding areas.

Mirabelle Festival (August): Annual celebration of the famous local plum with markets, tastings, cultural performances, and culinary events highlighting regional cuisine.

Metz en Scènes (June-July): Summer festival featuring theater, music, dance, and artistic performances in various city venues and outdoor spaces.

Jeudi de la Cathédrale (Summer): Thursday evening concerts in the cathedral featuring diverse musical genres from classical to contemporary.

Visual Music Festival (October): Contemporary music festival with performances, installations, and experimental artistic events celebrating modern sound.

National Holidays: Bastille Day (July 14) celebrations include fireworks and festivities. All Saints' Day (November 1) and Christmas (December 25) are observed with traditional observances.

Five Perfect Days in Metz

Day 1: Medieval Metz & Cathedral

Morning: Explore Old Town's winding streets and medieval architecture. Visit local boutiques and cafés. Lunch: Try local quiche lorraine at a traditional restaurant. Afternoon: Spend 2-3 hours in the Cathedral of Saint-Étienne admiring stained glass. Visit Place Saint-Louis. Evening: Sunset walk along the Moselle River.

Day 2: Museums & Contemporary Art

Morning: Spend 2-3 hours at Musée de la Cour d'Or exploring Roman artifacts and medieval collections. Lunch: Café near the museum. Afternoon: Visit the spectacular Pompidou Centre Metz for contemporary art and architecture. Evening: Aperitif at a riverside café watching sunset.

Day 3: Nature & Neighborhoods

Morning: Stroll through Les Jardins de la Seille. Breakfast at a waterside café. Afternoon: Explore the Imperial Quarter's grand 19th-century architecture; visit Petite France district with its charming waterfront views. Evening: Dinner at a local bistro featuring Lorraine cuisine.

Day 4: Day Trip to Verdun

Full day: Drive or train to Verdun (30 km). Explore the Verdun Citadel underground, visit the Ossuary memorial, and explore WWI battlefield sites. Museum exhibits provide historical context. Late afternoon: Return to Metz for evening rest or exploration.



Day 5: Art, Culture & Relaxation

Morning: Visit Arsenal Gallery for contemporary art. Explore smaller religious sites (Temple Neuf, Chapel of the Assumption). Late morning: Relax in Esplanade Gardens. Afternoon: Final shopping at local markets and boutiques. Evening: Special dinner at a Michelin-recommended restaurant celebrating regional specialties.

Best Photography Locations

Cathedral of Saint-Étienne: Golden hour (early morning or late afternoon) illuminates the façade beautifully. Interior stained glass photographs best at midday when sunlight streams through windows. Night illumination creates dramatic silhouettes.

Place Saint-Louis: Symmetrical square with arcaded buildings perfect for architectural photography. Early morning light casts long shadows; evening creates warm golden tones. Perfect for street photography and architectural compositions.

Moselle River Bridges: Bridges offer excellent vantage points for skyline photography. Best during golden hour for reflected light in water. The iron bridges create interesting compositional elements.

Petite France District: Charming waterfront buildings reflect beautifully in water channels. Early morning mist creates atmospheric conditions. Summer evening light is particularly stunning for romantic shots.

Pompidou Centre Metz: Dramatic white tent-like structure photographs best from various angles. Exterior architecture is striking during daytime; nighttime illumination creates unique effects. The building frames other city elements creatively.

Imperial Quarter Avenues: Wide boulevards with classical architecture photograph well from street level. Architectural details and monuments provide strong compositional elements. Late afternoon light emphasizes stone textures.

Electricity & Power

Voltage & Frequency: France uses 230V AC at 50Hz. This differs from North American 110V; visitors from North America will need voltage converters for electrical devices.

Plug Types: France uses Type E plugs (round pins in a vertical line with a grounding socket). Most European Type C plugs (two round pins) also work in most sockets. Universal adapters with Type E capability are recommended.

Adapter Recommendations: Purchase adapters before traveling or at airport shops. Multi-outlet adapters accommodate multiple devices. Voltage converters required for non-dual-voltage devices (hair dryers, electric razors, etc.).

USB Charging: Many hotels and accommodations offer USB charging ports. Coffee shops and restaurants increasingly provide charging stations. Portable power banks are useful for day trips.

Power Availability: Modern hotels have adequate outlets; older properties may have limited sockets. Bring extension cords or power strips if bringing multiple devices.

Must-Try Metz & Lorraine Cuisine

Quiche Lorraine: The region's most famous dish—savory tart with bacon, eggs, and cream baked in pastry crust. Best enjoyed warm at traditional restaurants. Every bakery offers variations.

Mirabelle Plums: Golden plums central to Lorraine gastronomy. Enjoyed fresh in season (August-September), as liqueur, jam, or in tarts. Mirabelle liqueur (Mirabelle de Lorraine) is an excellent souvenir.

Madeleines: Small shell-shaped butter cakes from nearby Commercy; light, delicate, and iconic French pastries. Perfect with tea or coffee.

Potée Lorraine: Hearty traditional stew with pork, vegetables, and legumes—comfort food at its finest. Popular in autumn and winter.



Pâté & Terrines: Lorraine produces excellent liver pâtés, foie gras, and meat terrines. Local delis offer exceptional quality and variety.

Local Wines: Moselle Valley produces crisp white wines. Regional varietals offer excellent value. Local restaurants feature wine pairings with traditional dishes.
