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Things to do in Corfu

Landmarks & Monuments

Corfu's most iconic structures reflecting centuries of Venetian, French, and British influence. These landmarks define the island's architectural heritage and offer glimpses into its complex history.



Old Fortress (Palaio Frourio)

Must See

2-3 hours No Booking Needed

A magnificent **16th-century Venetian fortress** perched on a peninsula overlooking the old town. The fortress features two levels of fortifications with panoramic views of the Adriatic Sea. Inside, discover the Church of St. George and atmospheric casemates. The fortress is illuminated beautifully at night and offers **exceptional sunset views**. Allow 2-3 hours to explore all levels and enjoy the vistas.



New Fortress (Neo Frourio)

Built by the Venetians in the **16th-17th centuries**, this massive fortress dominates the harbor entrance. Liston Arcade

Top Pick

1-2 hours No Booking Needed

A stunning **Parisian-style colonnaded promenade** built during the French occupation. This elegant arcaded street frames the Esplanade and features upscale cafés, restaurants, and shops. The architectural style is unique in Greece and creates a charming, cosmopolitan atmosphere perfect for evening strolls and people-watching.

Tips for Landmarks & Monuments

- Visit the Old Fortress at sunset for dramatic lighting and cooler temperatures
- Combine both fortresses in one day for a comprehensive military history experience
- Free entry to fortresses; small entrance fees apply
- Wear comfortable walking shoes for uneven terrain



Museums & Galleries

Corfu's museums house treasures ranging from ancient artifacts to Byzantine mosaics and contemporary art. These collections provide context for understanding the island's diverse cultural influences.

Museum of Corfu (Antivouniotissa Museum)

Byzantine Museum of Corfu

Corfu Ceramics Museum

Tips for Museums & Galleries

- Most museums close by 3 PM; visit early in the day
- Photography restrictions apply in some museums; respect local guidelines
- Combo tickets available for multiple museum entries
- Many museums offer guided tours in English for an additional fee



Religious Sites

Corfu's churches and monasteries reflect the island's deeply spiritual traditions and architectural diversity. These sacred spaces offer peaceful retreats and stunning religious artwork.

Church of St. Spyridon Must See

The **holiest shrine in Corfu**, housing the relics of Saint Spyridon, the island's patron saint. This 16th-century Venetian church features an impressive **silver-plated sarcophagus** containing the saint's remains. The interior displays exceptional frescoes and Byzantine mosaics. The annual procession of St. Spyridon's relics (Easter and November) attracts thousands of pilgrims.

Vlacherna Monastery Top Pick

Tips for Religious Sites

- Respect dress codes in active monasteries (cover shoulders and knees)
- Remove shoes when entering certain sacred areas
- Photography may be prohibited in some areas; seek permission

Achilleion Palace Must See

Kanoni Archaeological Site Top Pick

- Visit palaces in morning hours for best interior photography and smaller crowds

Old Town (Palαιο Kastro) Must See

Parks & Gardens

Spianada Square Must See

Practical Information

Climate & Seasonal Considerations

April-May (Spring): Ideal temperatures (18-24°C), minimal rain, wildflowers bloom, fewer crowds than summer. Easter celebrations offer cultural immersion. This is the **optimal season** for visiting.

June-September (Summer): Warm to hot (24-30°C), peak tourism, crowded beaches and attractions, higher prices. July-August are extremely busy. Excellent swimming conditions but expect larger crowds at all sites.

October-November (Autumn): Pleasant temperatures (15-22°C), decreasing crowds, still warm enough for swimming. The olive harvest provides authentic agricultural tourism. Many facilities remain open but with reduced hours.

December-March (Winter): Cooler (10-15°C), occasional rain, minimal crowds, many beaches and water activities closed. Hotels and restaurants have limited hours. Best for cultural tourism and avoiding crowds. Christmas and New Year bring festive atmosphere.



Getting Around Corfu

Public Buses: Regular bus service connects Corfu Town to beaches and villages. Buses operate from early morning until late evening. Routes are numbered and well-marked. Purchase tickets at kiosks or pay drivers directly. Service is inexpensive but can be crowded during peak hours.

Taxis: Readily available in town, airport, and major destinations. Metered taxis are affordable for short distances. Longer journeys (e.g., to Achilleion Palace) should be pre-agreed upon pricing. Radio taxis are reliable and can be reserved through hotels.

Car Rentals: Numerous rental agencies provide cars, scooters, and motorcycles. Local roads are generally well-maintained but can be narrow with sharp curves. Parking in the old town is extremely limited; consider leaving vehicles in dedicated lots. International driving permit recommended.

Ferries: Seasonal ferries connect to neighboring islands (Diapontia, Paxos, Antipaxos) and Albania (Saranda). Ferry operators maintain scheduled service with summer increases. Book in advance during peak season.

Walking: Corfu Town is best explored on foot. The compact layout and narrow streets favor pedestrian access. Comfortable walking shoes essential for cobblestones and hills.

➔ Airport Transfer

Ioannis Kapodistrias International Airport (CFU) to city center:

- **Local Blue Bus (Line 15):** Runs roughly every 40 minutes to Corfu Town center in about 15 minutes, tickets around €1.70
- **Taxi:** Fixed-rate ride to Corfu Town takes about 10 minutes and costs around €15-20
- **Private Transfer:** Pre-booked car or minivan to hotels across the island, 10-45 minutes depending on destination, from around €25
- **Rental Car:** Pickup counters inside the terminal, self-drive to Corfu Town in about 15 minutes, from around €35 per day

Shopping & Local Products

Traditional Handicrafts: Purchase **handmade ceramics and pottery** from local artisans—distinctive Corfiot designs reflect centuries of tradition. **Olive wood carvings, wooden crafts,** and decorative items make memorable souvenirs. Local shops in the Old Town feature these products with higher quality and authenticity than mass-produced tourist goods.

Local Foods & Beverages: **Corfu olive oil** is exceptional—consider purchasing bottles to take home. **Local wines** from small producers, **Greek honey,** and **artisanal liqueurs** reflect regional flavors. **Corfiot pastries and sweets** like *pastitsada* and *mandolato* are available fresh from bakeries. Farmers' markets offer seasonal produce and local specialties.

Shopping Districts: The **Old Town** provides authentic local goods with character. The **Liston arcade** offers upscale boutiques and international brands. **Spianada Square's surrounding shops** cater to both tourists and residents. Markets in various towns feature fresh produce, textiles, and local products on designated days.

Bargaining: Haggling is generally not expected in modern shops but acceptable in markets and small family businesses. Respectful negotiation for bulk purchases or multiple items may yield modest discounts.

Celebrations & Annual Events

Pascha (Easter): The most significant celebration in Orthodox Greece (dates vary April-May). **Palm Sunday processions, Good Friday candlelit services,** and **elaborate Easter Sunday feasts** exemplify Greek tradition. The week features special foods, church services, and family gatherings. Attending local celebrations offers deep cultural insight.

Spyridon Festival (April & November): Honors Corfu's patron saint with religious processions, traditional music, and local festivities. The November celebration particularly features marching bands and traditional costumes. Thousands



gather to observe the saint's relics in ceremonial procession.

Corfu Carnival (pre-Lenten): February celebration featuring parades, costumes, music, and traditional Corfiot revelry. The **Lord of the Satires procession** is distinctive and colorful. Street celebrations and parties continue for several weeks, transforming the island into a festival atmosphere.

Greek Independence Day (March 25): National holiday with military parades, flag-raising ceremonies, and patriotic celebrations throughout Corfu. The main parade in Corfu Town features military units, school children, and traditional marching bands.

Festival Season (July-August): Cultural festivals, theatrical performances, and musical concerts occur throughout the island. The **Corfu Festival features international classical music performances** in historical venues. Regional village festivals celebrate local culture with traditional food, music, and dancing.

Sample 5-Day Itinerary

Day 1: Corfu Town Historical Immersion

Morning: Explore the **Old Town's narrow streets**, discovering hidden piazzas and architectural details. Visit the **Church of St. Spyridon** to see the patron saint's silver sarcophagus.

Afternoon: Spend time on **Spianada Square**, Europe's largest esplanade. Enjoy coffee under the **Liston arcade's** Parisian-style colonnade.

Evening: Return to town for dinner. Consider visiting **Kanoni** viewpoint to see the **Vlacherna Monastery** illuminated at dusk.

Day 3: Beach Day at Paleokastritsa

Morning: Travel to **Paleokastritsa Beach**, Corfu's most scenic beach destination. Swim in turquoise waters and snorkel among the dramatic limestone cliffs.

Midday: Lunch at a beachfront taverna with fresh seafood and local wines. Rest or explore nearby coves.

Afternoon: Visit **Kaiser's Throne** viewpoint nearby for sunset-worthy panoramic vistas of mountains and sea.

Evening: Dinner in the charming village above the beach with traditional Greek cuisine.

Day 4: Northern Beaches & Villages

Morning: Visit **Sidari Beach** with distinctive orange sand and the famous **Canal d'Amour** rock formations. Explore traditional fishing village atmosphere.

Afternoon: Visit nearby **Roda Beach** or explore the northern villages with authentic Corfiot culture. Tour a family-operated taverna or local pottery workshop.

Evening: Return to town or stay overnight in a northern village for authentic local experience. Traditional music and dancing often occur in village tavernas.



Day 5: Museums & Culture

Morning: Visit the **Museum of Corfu (Antivouniotissa Museum)** showcasing Byzantine mosaics and religious art in a 16th-century church setting.

Afternoon: Explore the **Byzantine Museum** with frescoes and artifacts from medieval periods. Consider a **cooking class** learning traditional Corfiot cuisine.

Late Afternoon: Shopping and browsing in the Old Town's specialty shops and galleries. Purchase local handicrafts and regional products.

Evening: Sunset drinks at a Spianada café. Farewell dinner at a restaurant reflecting your favorite Corfu memories.

Best Photography Locations & Timing

Vlacherna Monastery (Kanoni): The iconic white monastery against blue water is Corfu's most photographed sight. **Best time: Golden hour before sunset** (5-7 PM depending on season) when light is warm and reflections perfect. Avoid midday harsh light. Position yourself at Kanoni promontory for optimal framing with Mouse Island.

Old Fortress Sunset: Dramatic Venetian fortifications against glowing sky create stunning images. **Best time: 30 minutes before sunset** for optimal light on stone. Bring wide-angle lens to capture the expansive fortification and harbor views. Low light inside passages requires fast lens or high ISO.

Spianada Square (Liston Arcade): The elegant Parisian-style colonnade creates geometric compositions. **Best time: Early morning (7-9 AM)** for soft light, minimal crowds, and detail clarity. The shadows under the arcade provide interesting compositional lines.

Paleokastritsa Beach: Limestone cliffs and turquoise water create dramatic seascapes. **Best time: Morning (7-10 AM)** when light is fresh and water reflects sky colors vividly. Afternoon light creates harsh shadows on cliff faces.

Achilleion Palace Gardens: Statuary, fountains, and sea panoramas offer diverse photographic subjects. **Best time: Mid-morning (9-11 AM)** when gardens are lit but not harshly. Golden hour backlighting reveals garden texture and creates magical atmosphere.

Corfu Town Alleys: Narrow streets, shuttered windows, and flowers create atmospheric compositions. **Best time: Early morning or late afternoon** when sunlight illuminates colorful details. Overcast days provide even lighting for architectural photography.

Electrical Information

Voltage & Frequency: Greece uses **220-240V AC at 50Hz**. This is significantly higher than North American (110V) and different from some other regions. Confirm your device compatibility before traveling.

Plug Types: Greece primarily uses **Type C (Europlug)** and **Type F** plugs with two round pins. Some older establishments may have **Type E** outlets (French style). Purchase an adapter before travel or upon arrival.

Adapters & Converters: Visitors from non-European countries need **universal travel adapters** compatible with Greek outlets. Most hotels provide adapters at request, but carrying your own ensures availability. Voltage converters may be necessary for devices with 110V specifications.

Device Charging: Most modern smartphones, laptops, and camera chargers are **dual-voltage (110-240V)** and compatible with Greek electricity. Verify your specific devices before travel. USB power banks are convenient for charging devices while exploring.

Power Reliability: Electricity supply is generally reliable throughout Corfu including beaches and villages. Power outages are rare but can occur during extreme weather. Keep devices charged when exploring remote areas.



Culinary Specialties & Dining

Signature Corfiot Dishes: **Pastitsada** is the island's most famous dish—braised rooster with red wine, onions, and garlic served with pasta. **Sofrito** features thin veal slices in white wine sauce, a masterwork of simplicity and technique. **Bourdeto** showcases fresh fish in spicy tomato and wine sauce. These traditional dishes embody Mediterranean culinary philosophy.

Fresh Seafood: Corfu's coastal location ensures exceptional fresh fish and seafood. Daily specials feature whatever boats brought in—ask taverna owners what's fresh. **Grilled octopus, whole fish preparations,** and **lobster pasta** are excellent choices. Seafood tavernas near the port guarantee quality and freshness.

Local Produce & Oils: **Olive oil** is fundamental to Corfiot cuisine—the island produces exceptional extra-virgin oil with distinct flavor profiles. Fresh vegetables, particularly **tomatoes and eggplants**, feature prominently in Mediterranean preparations. Seasonal produce from local markets ensures quality and flavor.

Greek Wine & Beverages: Try local **Corfiot wines** from small producers offering unique terroir expressions. **Ouzo** (anise-flavored spirit) and **retsina** (resinated white wine) are cultural beverages. **Local liqueurs and brandies** make interesting digestifs after dinner.

Dining Customs: Dinner typically occurs 9-10 PM; restaurants don't become lively until 10 PM. Tipping 5-10% is appreciated but not obligatory. **Tavernas** offer casual atmosphere with family recipes; **restaurants** provide more formal settings. Sharing multiple dishes family-style is traditional and encouraged.
